

NEW FACES ARE RECORDED IN DOG HEAVEN

CHIEF OF POLICE HAS NEW METHOD OF DISPATCHING CANINES.

Are there any stray canines around your neighborhood, or have you one of your own whose soul you desire to have transmigrated? If so just lead the animal down to Ed Malley's office, the back room of which is occasionally used as a dog dispatchery. During the past few weeks several new faces have been recorded in dog heaven, the journey to that unknown land having started from the chief's office. Whenever there is a dog to be killed, the owner brings the animal to the police headquarters. Deputy Charles Slavin officiates as chief dispatcher while Jim Degan is the assistant. The big chief usually bosses the job or holds the dog. Chloroform is used to settle his dogship's existence. The liquid is poured on a cloth which is placed in a can. The can is then fastened muzzle-like to the head of the doomed animal who, with a few last wags of his tail, starts dreaming. In a few minutes the dog has ceased to be and his remains are relegated to the ash can in the back yard and the next day witnesses the removal to the dumping ground.

The officers have become adept in the work and can dispatch at least thirty dogs an hour. In order to keep in practice they desire that all persons having dogs they wish to be rid of, just ring up the station and a deputy will be sent to secure the canines.

COLD WEATHER MAKES TROUBLE FOR FIREMEN

DEPARTMENT RESPONDS TO FALSE ALARM YESTERDAY MORNING.

The burning out of a chimney in a residence near the high school summoned the fire department shortly after 6 o'clock yesterday morning. It was fortunate that the alarm was false as the department would have been powerless to combat a blaze in this section owing to the water pressure being insufficient to reach this height, as was demonstrated at the recent fire which destroyed two dwellings.

Chief W. J. Sinclair, of the department stated yesterday that every fire plug, with the exception of one, was in first class shape. The one mentioned froze some time ago. On Wednesday the chief tapped every plug and all responded, showing that the cold weather had not as yet affected them. Mr. Sinclair is keeping a close watch on the mains, as it would be a serious fault if a fire broke out and the hose was coupled to a frozen plug.

The large combination fire wagon has been abandoned during the time the snow is on the ground as it is rather difficult for the horses to make time hauling the heavy apparatus. A light wagon is being used, which contains a sufficient quantity of hose to fight almost any fire.

MAKES RECORD IN COLLECTION OF POLL TAX

SHERIFF OWENS COLLECTS \$7,074 DURING THE PAST YEAR.

Yesterday morning the Bonanza stated that the total amount of poll tax collected during the past year by Sheriff Owens amounted to \$7,750.40. This was an error and represented the collections of December. The total collections for the year amount to \$7,074.00 which is considerable in excess of the amount collected by Esmeralda county. This sum represents personal collections and not the tax paid by property holders, which is placed on the assessment roll and paid direct to the county treasurer.

WAS SURPRISED AT RAPID GROWTH OF TONOPAH

OLD TIMER NOTICES MANY CHANGES IN APPEARANCE OF THIS CITY.

"To say that I am surprised at the growth of Tonopah, would be a mild expression," said Wils Brounger yesterday while lounging in the lobby of the Mizpah hotel. "I last visited southern Nevada nearly four years ago, and the changes since that date are something wonderful. The appearance of Tonopah at the present is a vast contrast to the camp of the early days and from the reports of the various mines of this district, I would say that this city has hardly commenced to grow."

Mr. Brounger was one of the pioneers of Tonopah and during the leasing days opened the Mizpah saloon with his brother Cal Brounger, who is also visiting here at the present time. This resort was on the present site of the Mizpah hotel. Later the two brothers became interested in one of the leases from which they derived a small fortune.

Both are interested in a number of local mining companies besides having business interests here. During Mr. Brounger's absence the State Bank building, Mizpah hotel, Tonopah Club block and numerous other large stone buildings have been erected, so it is but natural that he should be surprised at the change in the appearance of Tonopah. He will remain here for several days yet looking after his private affairs.

GAS PLANT CLOSES DOWN FOR REPAIRS

LEAKING BOILER CAUSES CESSATION IN MAKING THE JUICE.
