HAILED INTO COURT FOR USING A REVOLVER

IDA WONDERLIN OBJECTS TO HAVING YARD USED AS A DUMPING GROUND.

She demanded a jury trial and further stated that she did not want any of the Tonopah lawyers to handle her case and would send to Goldfield for her counsel. Judge Atkinson continued the case until next Wednesday.

Ejection proceedings were started some time ago by the Tonopah Mining company against Mrs. Wonderlin, over the title to the ground on which her residence stands. The Red Plume dump has been gradually approaching the territory claimed by Mrs. Wonderlin and of late rocks have rolled into her yard. Yesterday's one-sided argument was the result, but it is thought no further hostilities will prevail until the case is settled.

GUN FIGHT NOT SO SERIOUS AS REPORTED

ALTERCATION IN SOUTHERN PART OF STATE WAS EXAGGERATED.

Some few weeks ago there was a mix-up at Tecopa, the well known California mining camp located south of Bullfrog, between James H. Lester and one Ellison. Lester is the general manager of the Tecopa mine, and Ellison was one of the engineers in charge of the work of building the railroad spur from the T. & T. to the mine.

The reports of the fracas, which were printed in several Nevada and California papers, did Mr. Lester great injustice. Lester was pictured in lurid colors as being a bad man with a gun, shooting Ellison without provocation, etc. The Bonanza is in possession of authentic information on the unfortunate affair, and in justice to Mr. Lester, who, besides being one of the most prominent mining men in the west, has borne the very best of a reputation as a law-abiding citizen. It can be said that Lester did not assault Ellison without ample provocation. He did not shoot Ellison, as has been stated, but in the scrap which was the sequel to a war of words, Lester hit Ellison with his gun. Nor has Lester been arrested, pending the outcome of Ellison's injuries, as has been published. Ellison's hurts are not very serious, and Lester is in no great danger of being snatched by the officers from the bosom of his very interesting family at Tecopa.

Mr. Lester was at one time manager of the Tramp property at Bullfrog, where he enjoyed the esteem and confidence of everybody. Lester is a gritty little fellow, and has been known to engage in fistfights, but not because he is of a quarrelsome nature; he simply will not be imposed upon. He would rather fight than suffer imposition, such as was attempted, it is stated, by Ellison.
