LAST COMPANY QUILTS GREENWATER FOR NEW FIELD

As a contrast to the many mining companies which are failures, it is certainly gratifying, and a matter of pride, to tell of one which has been so well managed that while its mining ground has proven to be a failure the company has not yet gone to the demerit bow-wows, but still has a substantial treasury and is taking steps to carry out the intention of its stockholders in developing and operating a profitable copper mine.

The Greenwater Copper company, after sinking on its claims at Greenwater to a depth of 1,400 feet and doing much other exploratory work reached the conclusion that while the property contains copper it is too low grade to be made profitable, and that it would be good business to utilize the remainder of the treasury in developing some other property. Consequently the Greenwater is being abandoned by the company and its machinery—one hundred tons of it—will be immediately brought to the railroad at Death Valley station, preparatory to

being forwarded to the new location of the company.

Just where the new location will be is not determined—or at least not announced. It is understood that the company is investigating the merits of other properties and it may be some time before decision is made.

Al McPherson, of Rhyolite, has taken the contract to move the machinery from the mine to the railroad and has already tackled the job.

The course of this company is a commendable example in mining, and it is good business. It has nearly \$150,000 still in its treasury and much suitable mining machinery. Both of these assets the managers propose to employ in carrying out the original object of the investors.

It is probable that such sterling management will succeed in developing a property and establishing a profitable mine for the company. It is well to note that not all disappointed companies go to pieces completely.

NEVADA IN LIST OF QUICKSILVER PRODUCERS

Statistics collected by H. D. McCaskey, of the United States geological survey, from the producers, show that the total production of quicksilver in the United States in

1909 was 200,425 flasks of seventy-five pounds each, valued at the average New York price in 1909—\$46.17 per flask—at \$943,022.

The figures represent exactly the production for the first eleven months of 1909, plus the estimated production for December.

The production by states shows a decrease in California from 16,984 flasks in 1908 to 15,700 flasks in 1909; an increase in Texas from 2,832 flasks in 1908 to 3,925 flasks in 1909; and an increase in combined output from Nevada and Oregon from 346 flasks in 1908 to 800 flasks in 1909. In 1909, for the first time in many years, there was a small production in Nevada, but no production was reported from either Arizona or Utah.

WIRELESS ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

Wireless telegraphy is no longer surprising a world accustomed to wonders, and a wireless telephony has also come to be accepted without comment; but we are now to have wireless lighting, according to the Inventive Age. Science has long known that an electric current passing through a vacuum will produce a vivid light, and this knowledge is now to be utilized commercially. A rarified gas—nitrogen or carbon dioxide—is to be employed instead of an actual vacuum, and the illuminant is said to be superior to arc or incandescent lamps,

and to be better distributed. A drawback to the system has resided in the fact that after the current has been passing through the tube for some time the gas apparently becomes absorbed, with the consequent lessening of the light. This obstacle has now been overcome by the use of an automatic valve, through which the tube may replenish its supply of gas from a reserve tank—the valve to be controlled by the pressure of the tube itself.

TWO MEN ARE KILLED BY TRAIN NEAR RHYOLITE

During the night of Monday last, two men, native Californians, were killed by a train on the Las Vegas & Tonopah railroad near Indian Springs, according to the Rhyolite Herald. These men, with others working on the railroad, came into Rhyolite to purchase shoes. They came on a handcar. Their foreman was with them, and there were five in the party. They waited for the train from Goldfield to pass through so that the track would be clear for their return. The storm delayed the train. Finally, the foreman went across the country on a wagon and left word for the men to follow on the handcar, and it seems that they did so. After proceeding several miles they separated, two continuing with the car and arriving safe. The other two were supposed to cross the country and reach their home before those on the car could do so. But they did not. Next morning they were found dead and mangled along the railroad track. Their deaths were reported Tuesday and on Wednesday the acting coroner and deputy sheriff went out in the storm with a team to recover the corpses and bring them to town. On Thursday an inquest was held and the verdict was that Miguel Hernandez and Modesto Savolle came to their death by being struck by a railroad train near Indian Springs.

Of course they will be interred at the expense of the county, adding to the expense of officials, travel, etc.

These men who went out on the hand car carried with them several bottles of whiskey. From information and a study of conditions it seems that it was a case of simple drunkenness, when the two men fell asleep on the railroad track and a train finished the carousal for them.
