WHAT ABOUT THE MINT.

What is to be done about opening the mint in Carson City for the coining of the gold and silver produced in the state? Are the heads of the departments of the state, the governor, the secretary of state, the attorney general, the treasurer, and in fact all the men who have been elected as the representatives of the people to sit idle and do nothing when the great injustice that is being shown the state is pointed out to them?

Are the men who represent the state in the senate and in the house of representatives blind to the fact that Nevada is not being treated right in the matter or are they so secure in their positions that they do not care anything about it?

What is the Carson City Promotion association doing in the matter? Is it something that is above their powers, and do they hesitate to petition the above mentioned representatives at Washington to do something in the matter. When the constitution of the United States was adopted by our forefathers, it was signed with the idea that it was for the welfare of the nation and for the millions that were to come after. It was designed with the one idea of giving justice to all and special favors to none and was so worded that the men constituting the ruling body should be the representatives of the people and supposed to carry out their will. Would it not be possible to induce our representatives to read that grand old document and then ask them to do something toward gaining an equal privilege for the state they represent and have Uncle Sam once again occupy the home he built in Carson and use it for the purpose it was intended for?

What is there to prevent the Carson City Promotion association from holding a meeting and considering the matter and then taking some action? A petition signed by a large number of the residents of the state of Nevada might do something toward gaining the end and at any rate it is worth trying.—Carson News.

NO FAITH IN COURT.

The old saying that "justice is blind" is again brought to the fore by the verdict returned in Judge Somers' court at Goldfield in the case of George Gibson, who several years ago shot and killed in cold blood Richard Maunsell, a young mining engineer. However, it may have been possible that the members of the jury were of the opinion that the prisoner deserved a light sentence which would have resulted in a recommendation for mercy at the hands of the court. Past experience has taught the Goldfielders that the court, Judge Somers, to be exact, pays but little heed to such recommendations, evidently thinking that his one brain is more capable of handling and understanding matters than the twelve combined brains of the jury. If this proves true, it is no wonder that the jury were unable to agree.

We all know that practically the entire banking business of the country is conducted by soundly managed banking institutions, and that practically all the money on deposit in banks is safe. We also all know that frequently irresponsible people start a business which they call a bank, and that when, as it inevitably must, it fails, how big scarehead lines announce the incident in the newspapers, carrying dismay and fear into the hearts of a large proportion of bank depositors, causing in almost every case large withdrawals from the sound banks. It is remarkable how sensitive the public is to scare reports of this kind. An illustration of this happened a few years ago, at the time of the great inundation of the Imperial valley, California, by the waters of the Colorado river. One newspaper in a large city, in very black and bold type, published these words across the top of its front page: "Banks of the Colorado Break." This announcement caused a run on two or three of the banks in that city, and the withdrawal of over \$1,000,000, before the frightened people were quieted.
