**WEIGHING THE MAIL.**

Yesterday the weighing of the mail commenced in all the western states and will continue for thirty days. Competition between the Harriman and Hill lines for the mail carrying contract between Chicago and the northwest has resulted in the addition by the Union Pacific and Oregon Short Line of the fastest schedule ever given a train over the Harriman system, the quick service to become effective next Sunday. The Chicago Portland fast mail, which splits into two sections at Granger, Wyo., one of the sections arriving at Salt Lake from the east at 2:20 p. m., will now reach that city nearly two hours earlier than heretofore. From Granger to Huntington, Ore., a distance of 541 miles, the train will consume just thirteen hours, a record never before made on any of the Harriman lines. This means a running time of forty miles an hour, or, eliminating the stops, fifty-one miles an hour.

**A WARM TIME AHEAD.**

The county commissioners of Lyon county will hold a meeting at Dayton on Saturday, the 26th, at which time the board will consider the petition presented by the Yerington people and others in the county seat fight. The petition asks for a special election to decide the question of the county seat and it is expected that there will be a warm time at the meeting. Yerington is the city where the new court house should be built. It is the only feasible location. The bugaboo town of Mason is only a dream of a townsite company.

**MADE RICH STRIKE.**

Another strike of rich ore is reported from the Delaware district to the east of Carson, this time on Yellow Boy property owned by Jim Cowden and associates, and the owners are highly elated over the new find as are many other local

people who are interested there. The strike was made several days ago while sinking on the property. At a depth of about 30 feet a ledge was encountered which showed free gold and the miners immediately got busy developing the new find. Additional blasts were placed and two feet was sunk through the ledge which has not yet been intersected.
