

## IRATE CITIZEN AND JURYMAN IN A MARATHON

**PUBLIC SENTIMENT CONTINUES STRONG AGAINST MURDERER SKINNER.**

That the state of public sentiment against Fred Skinner, who was found guilty Tuesday morning of murder in the second degree, is somewhat incensed, has been proven during the last two days, when two members of the jury, who were opposed to giving Skinner a severe penalty, came near receiving severe beatings at the hands of irate citizens.

Jacob C. Friek, foreman of the jury, who was against returning a first degree verdict, was the recipient of a blow Tuesday night while standing in front of the Tonopah club, conversing on the trial. But one blow was struck, owing to the intervention of bystanders.

Wednesday morning James Hayes, a juryman from Round Mountain, who favored the acquittal of Skinner, participated in a Marathon stunt to escape from the clutches of A. E. Falconer of Rhyolite. The ability of Hayes in the foot racing line saved him from a deserved beating.

Mr. Falconer is very familiar with the case and was conversing with Hayes on the subject when the Round Mountain man started to argue in an idiotic manner concerning his opinion of the trial. It was then that Mr. Falconer informed Hayes of his opinion and told the juryman in rather forcible language just where he stood in his (Falconer's) estimation. At this point Hayes happened to think of a forgotten engagement down the street and started to keep the appointment. Mr. Falconer objected to Hayes going alone and started to keep him company. But Hayes was in a hurry and started to run, evidently having a better conception of Falconer's intentions, than he had of the guilt of Skinner.

It is understood that Hayes left yesterday for his home at Round Mountain, not deeming it advisable to tarry in this city any longer.

## IMPROVEMENT IS NOTED IN LEASES AT PIONEER

**PIONEER OF PIONEER IS BEING ENTERTAINED BY PIONEER OF TONOPAH.**

R. B. Glover, who is leasing at Pioneer, came up from the south end of the county last evening and will remain here for several days in order to once more become familiar with metropolitan life. R. B. Ryan, who is operating the K. K. property, has uncovered pay ore and will continue the work until he has a good quantity blocked out. The new leasing company, that took over the Mayflower mine, is preparing to start work on a large scale and a small force of men is employed timbering the underground workings.

This is Mr. Glover's first visit to the outside world for a year, and for a day or two he will travel about under the guidance of Len McGarry and Jim Skelton, until he becomes accustomed to the ropes.

## AUSTIN DISTRICT IS NOW WITHOUT RAILROAD SERVICE

**THIRTY-FIVE MILES OF TRACK IS WASHED AWAY BY THE FLOODS.**

George A. Watt of the Lander County Cattle association, accompanied by N. M. Wardome, of Boston, who has been looking after mining interests at Austin, arrived from that camp last night aboard one of the Consolidated Auto cars, piloted by Shorty Kutzkau. The machine met the gentlemen at Spencer's ranch, having traveled that far in a private conveyance.

The Nevada Central railroad, according to Mr. Watt, has been completely washed away by the flood waters, caused by the melting snows and it has been about three weeks since a train has been able to run. According to the present outlook, the thirty-five miles of line, will be out of commission for a number of months. Since the washout, the Lander county commissioners have made no effort to relieve the trouble and passengers are forced to travel to Battle Mountain in carriages. All the bridges have been washed away and in many places the track has completely disappeared.

It is impossible to secure hay in the district and cattle owners are turning their herds out to graze. The feeding is sparse and it is believed that many of the animals will fail to survive until they can be driven to good feeding ranges, or until hay can be transported into the locality.

Mr. Watt recently contracted to sell a herd of cattle and after making preparations to ship the animals, the washouts occurred, and he is now sending the herd overland to Mina where they will be loaded and sent north on the Southern Pacific. Recently the cattle association purchased the herd of Hereford cattle from the John Sparks estate at Reno, and negotiations are now under way with a prominent California ranch man to take the entire stock.

Mr. Watt leaves tomorrow morning for northern California where he will endeavor to purchase sheep for the Austin range.

## EVERY LEASE AT RAWHIDE HAS MADE STRIKES

**RECENT ARRIVAL EXHIBITS PICTURE ROCK FROM NORTHERN CAMP.**

"Every lease in the camp of Rawhide has made a strike within the last few weeks," stated J. J. Ramsey, a recent arrival from that camp yesterday. "The finds are not of the ordinary kind, and especially is this so with the Marigold lease. The operators there have a ledge that is exceptionally rich and are taking out ore that can be classed as the real quill. Other leasers, who have made strikes, are hammering away and rapidly coming into prominence."

Mr. Ramsay exhibited a number of specimens from the Marigold property, all of which show large quantities of free gold. He is an experienced mill man and may locate in this city permanently. He said yesterday that all that was lacking in Rawhide at the present day to make that camp one of the best in the state, was adequate milling facilities, so that the ores could be treated without the heavy expense resulting from transportation to the smelters.

"If the late strikes had been made a year ago," continued Mr. Ramsey, a second rush would have resulted that would have exceeded the first boom, for now the companies have the ore, while at first it was mainly theories that caused the stampede."
