

# IMPORTANT STRIKE HAS BEEN MADE IN THE MACNAMARA MINE

Price of Shares Advances Five Points as Soon as Find is Made Known.

The rumored strike in the MacNamara mine was confirmed last evening, although from an unofficial source, and the find is pronounced to be of extreme importance to the company. The ledge is reported to be in virgin territory and is about two feet in width. It is understood that assays have been received as high as \$260 to the ton.

The magnitude was demonstrated by the actions of the stock market, MacNamara stock selling as high as 40 cents on the closing. The news of the find coming on the heels of the increased activities in other securities was the one sole topic of conversation yesterday, and many speculators desiring quick action on their holdings, disposed of other stocks and purchased MacNamara.

## EPSTINE WILL SOON RECEIVE ALL TONOPAH SALES

LOCAL TRADING IN STOCKS IS REPORTED AS QUITE HEAVY.

"The interest manifested by the people of Tonopah in stocks, and their confidence in our mines is amazing," said Harry Epstine, the local broker yesterday. "Orders have been pouring in and if the rush keeps up, and appearances indicate that it will, I will soon commence to receive the complete report of the Tonopah sales on the San Francisco stock exchange."

Broker Epstine was asked if he would soon return to the private wire and responded that the splendid service as furnished by the Postal company, was far better than a private wire. "I have sent messages to New York and Philadelphia and received an answer inside of six minutes," he said. "The corresponding time to San Francisco has proved astonishing and on a number of occasions answers have been returned to me within a minute or two."

It appeared yesterday that the crowd surrounding the closing market quotations was swelled to a greater degree and at times the observers completely blocked the traffic. Nor were the curious ones confined to the male sex, for numerous women stopped for a minute or two and scanned the list. The broad smile that illuminated their features as they would continue on their way, showed plainly that the stocks they were interested in had advanced.

## CROSS COUNTRY RUN SATURDAY FOR LOCAL ATHLETES

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS WILL ENGAGE IN ENDURANCE CONTEST.

A cross-country run has been scheduled by the athletes of the Tonopah high school to take place Saturday afternoon from the volunteers gymnasium. ## MAKES DEMANDS ON DEFUNCT BANK FOR COUNTY FUNDS

COUNTY TREASURER COMPLIES WITH REQUIREMENTS OF SURETY CONCERNS.

Frank P. Mannix, county treasurer, returned last evening from Rhyolite, where he had gone several days ago to make a legal tender for the county money on deposit in the Rhyolite First National bank that suspended Monday. Mr. Mannix was unsuccessful in his mission, which was undertaken solely for the purpose, of keeping within the reach of the legal requirements.

J. A. H. Kerr, the national bank examiner, is now in charge of the closed institution, and already has filed suit against the parties in debt to the bank. One of the suits was filed in the district court yesterday afternoon by Baker and Morris, who will represent the bank. Mr. Kerr is temporary in charge pending the appointment of a permanent receiver.

The surety companies protecting the county deposits in the bank have been notified and a representative is expected here daily. The county will shortly be remunerated and the dividends from the bank will go to the surety companies.

## MAY REACH AN ADJUSTMENT ON WAGES

THREATENED REDUCTION OF TRAINMEN'S WAGES MAY NOT TAKE PLACE.

Some weeks ago President M. M. Cutter of the Tonopah and Goldfield railroad served notice on the trainmen that a reduction in wages aggregating about 40 per cent, would take place on the first of the month. The railroad men immediately communicated with their head officers and it is understood that several of the officials will arrive in town shortly to investigate the matter. It is not thought that any serious difficulties will result, now that the railroad business is rapidly increasing, and an adjustment will probably be reached before the end of the month.

**POSTPONE MICK CASE UNTIL SATURDAY MORNING**

A postponement was taken yesterday in the case of Joe Mick, charged with arson, until Saturday morning. The delay was necessitated by Assistant District Attorney J. H. Morris having been summoned to Rhyolite on business in connection with the county's money on deposit in the bank at that place. Mr. Morris will leave this morning and will return Friday evening.
