## A LIFE SITUATION.

There have been very few jurists in this western country to establish such a record as has resulted since Judge M. R. Averill ascended the bench in the Fifth Judicial court in this city. When Judge Averill went into office, the calendar of his court was congested with cases of every description. At the end of a year the slate was just about clean and to accomplish this, the jurist has worked night and day.

Contrary to the general rule, there has been but very little dissatisfaction with his rulings, all parties concerned agreeing that he was in a position to decide, and that the decision would be made conscientiously. It may be well to state that by far the majority of the cases have been without a jury, the questions being submitted to the court.

In yesterday's decision Judge Averill made a ruling in a case that placed him in a rather uncompromising position, yet he did not spare any words in setting forth his opinion. And at that there has not been a single person to criticize the verdict whereby the five strikebreakers were removed from the toils of the law. The people of Tonopah realized that the court decided on the merits of the case even if the decision was contrary to a popular conclusion.

Judge Averill has won the respect of the voters of Nye county by his fair dealings, and as long as he remains on the bench, the citizens of this sections can be assured that the rights of all will be looked after in a manner in keeping with the office.
