TWO LEASERS ON THE BOOTH ARE NOW WORKING IN ORE

Both leases on the Booth estate are in very promising ore at this time. Developments on the Weber-McLaughlin lease have shown that the ore shoot cut some weeks ago, when some very nice ore was extracted by development work, was cut on its apex. Several raises were put up in the ore shoot, and the formation proved almost conclusively that the apex had been cut.

As the operations were only at a depth of 150 feet this is very probable. A winze is now being put down in the ore and the showings in this are very favorable, indeed, and there is every indication that the downward extension of the vein will make a shipper of the lease.

In the Lind lease, at about 150 feet to the northeast of the shaft, at 360 feet depth, a winze is being put down in an enrichment that was encountered in the north drift in the big vein that was opened a little over a week ago. Some very fine quartz is coming from this winze, and samples show assay values of better than \$25 for a four foot face. The quartz is associated with much alunite and tale and contains globules of grey copper. There is little doubt that the Lind lease has caught the northeasterly extension of the Red Top vein. The quartz that is now being extracted is identical with that from the Red Top workings of the Consolidated, and a mining man who long occupied a responsible position with the Consolidated states that there is no doubt that the Red Top vein is what the leasers have picked up.

To the southwest of the shaft, in the old Durgan workings, the leasers are starting to explore a big ledge of highly oxidized quartz. The quartz much resembles some of the richest oxide ore ever found in the camp. Values as yet are very low, however. This oxidized lead is a cross lead, and will be followed to its junction with the north and south lead which is being worked in the east workings of the shaft, and with every indication that an ore body of commercial value will be picked up either at the junction or before it is reached. —Goldfield News.

WATCH LEE'S CELL FEARING SUICIDE

**MAN CHARGED WITH ATTACK
ON DAUGHTER MAY TRY
TO END LIFE.**

Watched night and day in the fear that he may make another and more determined attempt to end his life, John Lee, the Gardnerville rancher, charged with attacking his own daughter last Sunday, is confined in the county jail at Genoa awaiting a hearing next Monday.

The authorities are taking every precaution that the man shall not escape justice by suicide, and a constable sits near his cell continually. Lee remains morose and sullen, talking little, and offering no explanation of his unnatural assault on his 14-year-old daughter, Nora.

The little girl is in a precarious condition at the big ranch house, it is said. Neither her mother, nor the nine brothers and sisters would make any statement during the day but information was received that Nora's condition is serious. The family physician has made several trips to the Lee ranch, which is several miles out of Gardnerville.

The neighborhood is in a ferment over the father's act. Threats were made openly that lynching

was the proper course to take yesterday and the authorities feared that a mob might form and storm the jail. To that effect extra guards were on duty all of last night and will remain near the scene until after the hearing. —Reno Journal.
