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## EARLY VOTE ON THE RAILROAD BILL

### Measure Will Soon Come Up for Final Passage in Senate

Regular Republicans Hold Situation Well in Hand Against Insurgents and Democrats.

Many Amendments are Put Up But All Are Voted Down---Believed the Final Vote Will Be Taken Today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—Through the defeat in the senate today of a number of amendments offered, by insurgents, republicans and democrats the way was paved for an early vote on the administration railroad bill. It is believed that will come tomorrow and the senate will then adjourn until Monday, when the statehood bill will probably be made unfinished business.

final decision on increases within 6 months was defeated, 18 to 54. The Clark amendment to defer the increased until passed upon by the commission, and putting them into effect after six months pending, was rejected, 35 to 40. The senate unanimously adopted the amendment composed of propositions by Jones and Painter, authorizing the interstate commerce commission to suspend increases in rates for six months beyond the 120 days fixed by the pending bill when even the reasonableness of increases cannot be determined within the original period. The amendment includes a provision for refunding the difference between rates if the new rate is found unreasonable.

### TAFT DESIRES TO USE NEXT YEAR'S EXPENSE MONEY

Spent His Last Allowance on His Trip Through the West and South---Will Have to Dig in His Own Pocket.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Taft's traveling expenses, and the fact that he already had overdrawn his allowance of \$25,000 a year voted to him by congress, led to an enthusiastic debate in the house today and the refusal to allow him to use his next year's allowance to meet the deficiency. As reported from the house committee on appropriations, an item of \$25,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1st next would come "immediately available" except for the protests of the democrats. The words "immediately available" was finally stricken out by the action of Mann of Illinois.

### Twenty-Seven Sailors are Carried to What is Believed Certain Death---Divers Now at Work.

CALIAS, France, May 26.—The French submarine Pluivoise, with all her crew, lies tonight with thirty fathoms of water over her. She was sent to the bottom of the English channel this afternoon by the cross-channel steamer Pas de Calais, which was crowded with passengers bound for Dover, which struck the partly submerged Pluivoise, when about two miles from the harbor. Accounts regarding the disaster differ. Admiral Fourrier expresses his opinion that the submarine attempted to pass beneath the big steamer, while other officials think the Pluivoise, after a long dive, came up by chance directly under the paddle wheels.

marine rapidly disappeared. Signals of distress from the Pas de Calais, which was making water fast, brought two tugs to the scene and later a torpedo boat destroyer put out and anchored near where the Pluivoise sunk. Within two hours a wrecking vessel was lying near the destroyer and the crew were making preparations to send down divers to locate the wrecked submarine, entombed in which were three officers and twenty-four men. The chances of rescue are slight, because, in the opinion of experts, either the naphtha reservoirs of the Pluivoise burst or the craft was so badly damaged that she filled.
