**HIGH GRADERS GET RICH ORE AN NATIONAL**

**SACK OF ORE VALUED AT \$3000 TAKEN BY ROBBERS WHO MAKE ESCAPE.**

Highgrade thieves, wearing masks, heavily armed and determined, entered Tunnel No. 3 1/2 of the National Mining company of Nevada at National on Friday night at about 11 o'clock and forced the men to take them to the shift boss, Ed Smith, who was in a stope leading off a tunnel. Then they forced all the miners and the shift boss into a stope with their hands above their heads, and picking up a sack of highgrade, valued at \$3000, walked from the mine with it.

Sheriff Lamb was notified of the theft and tried to secure an auto to leave for National Saturday morning, but was unable to find one and had to wait until a machine could travel from National to Winnemucca after him. No trace of the thieves with the high grade could be found and it is not believed they will be captured.

**MURPHY ESTATE SAID TO BE WORTH \$21,500**

Frank X. Murphy, the pioneer attorney, left an estate valued at \$21,500, according to the inventory and appraisal, which was filed in the clerk's office this afternoon. The report is signed by C. D. McDonald, James Cronin and W. B. Graham, who were appointed several days ago by Judge Mitchell to appraise the property owned by the Murphy estate.

Mr. Murphy owned real estate at Ely, Winnemucca, Tonopah and Bullfrog at the time of his demise, which is valued at \$8,250. He had title to three lots and what is known as the Joseph Rougon residence in Winnemucca. He also had a home in Bullfrog and Tonopah.

The estate controls 3,500 shares of stock in the Bullfrog West Extension company, which was one of the principal mining corporations in southern Nevada during boom days. The stock is said to be worth \$8,750. Ten thousand shares in the Tonopah-Yerington have been placed at \$1,000. Mr. Murphy had 500 shares of stock in the Winnemucca Publishing company, which owns the Silver State, claimed to be worth \$500.

The Tom Cornett mines, from which thousands of dollars were taken years ago, were in Mr. Murphy's possession when he died. The properties are now under bond to A. B. Mitchen and Charles Arundellett. A valuation of \$3,000 has been placed on the mines.—Ely Exporter.
