SHOULD STOCK ALL THE STREAMS OF NYE COUNTY

FISH CAN BE SECURED UPON APPLICATION FROM COMMISSIONER MILLS.

If application is made at once to Commissioner Mills at Carson City, young trout can be secured with which to stock the various streams in Nye county. The state hatchery has an abundance of young stock on hand and any number desired can be secured. The fish commissioner makes only one request and that is to have an automobile in waiting so that the fish can be conveyed as rapidly as possible to their destinations. The fish are sent in cans which have to be returned to the hatchery. It is up to the sportsmen of southern Nevada to make such an application and very little expense would result in having every stream in this county stocked. Within a year or so the fish will have a growth that will make the sport an enjoyable one. In the eastern and northern section of this county there are several streams that are just about empty of the finny tribe and a little energy on the part of the local disciples of Isaac Walton is all that is required for the stocking.

You and each of you will please take notice that on the 7th day of June, 1910, F. L.
