

NEVADA GETS TERMINAL RATES FROM THE EAST

INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION DECIDES AGAINST RAILROADS.

A telegram to the Goldfield News announces that the interstate commerce commission has decided in favor of Nevada in the fight against the railroads for terminal rates. This is the most important news received in this section for many a day and means the saving of thousands of dollars by the merchants and others who have to do business with the railroads.

Heretofore freight shipped from the east consigned to Reno or southern Nevada, commanded a greater rate than a shipment to San Francisco. In some cases the cut is more than half.

The rate from New York to Reno is made \$3.50 against \$4.29; from Chicago, \$2.90 against \$4.29; from Kansas City, \$2.50 against \$4.29; from Denver, \$2.10 against \$4.29. The present terminal rate to San Francisco is \$3. The rates at Winnemucca and other points east are a little lower than at Reno, owing to a shorter haul. Commodity rates not effected are left for subsequent class rates and will force a large number of commodities.

WILL OPEN THE REGISTER BOOKS ON SATURDAY

JUDGE ATKINSON WILL HAVE REGISTER OFFICE IN JUSTICE COURT.

Registration for the primary election will start July 2 at the office of Justice of the Peace H. H. Atkinson, who will officiate as registry agent. Parties who voted at the last election will not have to register for the primaries, but will have to visit the registration office in order to vote at the general election. Voters who have moved from one precinct to another during the last two years, will have to make a transfer before the primaries, otherwise they might not be allowed to cast their ballots.

County Clerk Robert G. Pohl has completed sending out the primary registration books and other papers to the different precincts in this county and all will start taking registration Saturday. The statutes of the state requires the books to be open fifty days prior to fifteen days before the election.

Mrs. North will close her house at Anganguco, and then go to La Luz to spend a few weeks with her parents before returning to Los Angeles with the ashes of her late husband.

The body was cremated at Dolores cemetery yesterday morning at 9 o'clock.

E. A. Strout and wife, Mrs. North's sister, left last night for Pachuca, where Mr. Strout is superintendent of the famous Santa Gertrudis mine.
