

# HON. T. L. ODDIE DEFINES VIEWS ON GOVERNORSHIP

## Southern Nevada Candidate Does Not Solicit Votes From Those Who Desire Special Privileges.

The following announcement was given to the Bonanza yesterday by Hon. T. L. Oddie and is self-explanatory. The text of the letter is clear and concise and defines the position of Mr. Oddie in a thorough manner, especially that part which reads that he does not seek votes from those who expect special privileges. The letter follows:

Tonopah, Nev., July 1, 1910.  
Editor Tonopah Bonanza, Tonopah, Nevada.

Dear Sir: I submit herewith to you a statement that I am a candidate for the office of governor on the republican ticket, subject to the action of the primary election to be held September sixth, next.

Various conditions have compelled me to wait until the last week in announcing my candidacy definitely, the most important being the decision of the supreme court on the primary law. Had this decision been adverse, I probably would not have entered the race, as I would have been so handicapped by the lack of a large campaign fund under the old convention system that I would have been put out of the running.

I have spent large amounts of money in developing various mining and other enterprises within the state, and during the last few years some of these have so taxed my resources that at the present time I can ill afford to expend the sums which were expected to be disbursed by a candidate under the old convention system.

The new primary law means that the voters of this state will have the privilege of casting their ballots on September sixth for the men of their choice, and upon this issue I am prepared to go before the people in a clean-cut, open contest, feeling that whoever may be chosen as the candidate will win on his merits and that the campaign will be free from the malignant and unpatriotic influences which have so largely controlled so many nominations in the past.

The law provides that such candidates as may be chosen by their

respective parties shall, after having received the nomination at the primaries, confer together and formulate a platform upon which the canvass for votes at the general election shall be conducted.

I do not desire at this time to forecast any portion of such platform as may be put forth by the nominees named by the republican primaries, but in view of the fact that I am soliciting votes to be cast for me at the republican primaries in September, I feel that it is due to my friends that I make a brief statement of my views, so that they may be guided in arriving at a decision as to whether or not they will support my candidacy.

The state of Nevada has passed through a long period of depression, by reason of which, no one has suffered more severely than my associates and myself. I believe that this condition has run its course, and that the ensuing years will be marked by prosperity and contentment to all of our citizens who have the energy, confidence and staying qualities to take advantage of the many opportunities awaiting them within this state.

It will be my aim, if elected, governor, to make every effort to bring about a healthier condition within the state, whereby a man who is willing to do a fair day's work can be sure of a fair day's pay, and a man willing to invest his money in any legitimate and conservative enterprise within the state can expect fair returns and fair treatment.

I do not solicit the votes of any men or set of men who are looking for a candidate with an abundance of money to spend at the primaries or in the campaign.

I furthermore do not solicit the votes of any men or set of men who desire special privileges of any nature. I present myself as the candidate of such of our citizens as desire a fair, square deal, no more, no less.

He is out again on the democratic ticket for the nomination and but little doubt exists that he will succeed.

In the old days when Tonopah was visited by the first plague, it was Puddy that acted as nurse and helped many stricken patients regain their former health. A professional nurse could not be hired for love nor money and the county hospital was crowded with dying patients. Shortly afterwards he secured about \$300 from the Nevada First National bank, the bank previously having been ordered to cash certain checks which he possessed. Since that Lorraine has dropped out of sight. He secured a room for that night but the bed was never occupied.

He left no word with acquaintances as to any intended journey nor had he expressed his intention to attend the big fight at Reno. His whereabouts are a mystery for not a trace has been found since Tuesday night. The officers in the nearby towns have been notified to be on the lookout as it is thought that he got on a spree and drifted to some other camp.
