Fierce Flames Threaten Destruction of Life and Property in Half a Dozen Towns of the Northwest.

MISSOULA, Mont., August 20.—Wallace, Idaho, is doomed at 10:30 tonight. The whole town is on fire. The flames were first communicated to the south end of the town from the forest fires. The last words of the telephone operator were that the fire was within sixteen feet of him and he had to run for his life. Women and children were rushed out on a special train over the Oregon Railway and Navigation line. At 11:15 communication with Wallace was impossible, telegraph and telephone operators having left their posts. It is not believed that any lives have been lost.
Shortly after 11 o'clock district officials of the forestry service were notified that the town of Libby, in northern Montana, was in imminent danger.

Troops Called to Fight Flames.

PORTLAND, Ore., August 20.—The forest fires which are devastating the various parts of the northwest are more threatening tonight than at any time this year. In Oregon, the most serious situation exists in that part of the Cascade forest reserve that generally speaking, lies between Klamath Falls and Medford. Two great fires are raging in this district, one in the vicinity of Mount McLaughlin (Mt. Pitt) and the other at Ashland Creek. The latter is threatening the water supply and electric light plant at Ashland. About 500 men are in the field to fight the flames and two hundred and fifty soldiers are on their way from American Lake, Wash.
According to Forester Cecil the fire has a frontage of twenty-five miles.
Cecil telegraphed Washington tonight urging the forestry service to arrange with the war department to have the entire Oregon National guard ordered out to fight the flames.

Montana Forests Also Burning.

KALISPELL, Mont., August 20.—The forest fire situation in northern Montana is the worst in the history of this section, the result of high winds this afternoon. Three new fires are reported today, together with the destruction of two forest rangers' camps and all of their supplies. The men have fled and their whereabouts are unknown tonight. In the Blackfoot forest tonight alone there are nine distinct fires, many of them practically beyond control.

DES MOINES MAYOR OUSTED FROM JOB

NEVADA BROKERS ARE INVOLVED

NEW YORK, August 20.—After a swarm of customers, stirred by rumors, had assembled in front of the office of B. H. Sheffels & Co., curb brokers, yesterday afternoon, B. H. Sheffels issued a statement in part as follows:
"A clique of stock brokers who have been operating for a decline in a group of stocks in which we are interested, circulated a rumor to the effect that we were slow in taking up the securities. As a result there ensued a rush to make deliveries and certify all outstanding checks. One of the banks with whom we are doing business, and on whom the checks were drawn, certified until 3:30 p. m., which was 30 minutes after the customary hour. Then they stopped. They could have stopped according to custom 30 minutes earlier had they wished.
"We called on the vice president of the bank at 4:30 and he gave us a statement showing that there was both a cash credit, and credit on outstanding collections amounting to thousands of dollars in excess of all outstanding claims."
Sheffels and company are one of the largest curb brokerage houses in New York and handle practically all the Nevada mining stocks that are bought or sold in New York and the east.

STEARNS' CAR MAKES RECORD

PLAGUE IN ITALY SEEMS ABATING

MILLIONAIRESS PUT OUT OF OLD HOME
