TEDDY WILL TARRY AWHILE IN MILWAUKEE

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 6.—The doctrine of "new nationalism," which Theodore Roosevelt enunciated in his speech at Ossawatimie recently, was set forth more clearly by him in a speech today before the National Conservation congress. He declared emphatically for government control of the country's natural resources. "If it had not been for corporate interests, especially those which may be described as predatory, we would never have heard this question of states' rights," he declared. Later he said: "It isn't really the question of a state against the nation. It is really a question of special corporate interests against the people." He said that corporations were anxious to have the states take up the work that they might escape all effective control. Throughout the speech Roosevelt emphasized the need of giving over to the national government the task of carrying on, in the main, the work of conservation. The colonel left tonight for Milwaukee.

BIG HARVESTER COMPANY DECLARED TO BE A TRUST

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Sept. 6.—Special Commissioner Theodore Brace, in his report to the supreme court in the ouster suit filed today, declared the International Harvester Company of New Jersey, a trust and combine for a purpose with the effect of destroying competition in the manufacture and sale of harvesting machinery. The International Harvester company of America was, he declared, to be used as a selling agent by the New Jersey company, in evasion of the laws of Missouri, which prohibit licensing a New Jersey concern by reason of the enormous capital, one hundred and twenty millions. The action was an information in quo warranto which asked that all franchises and privileges of the company in Missouri be revoked and that its property be confiscated or a fine imposed. The Harvester company will file exceptions to the report and the case will be argued and submitted in the supreme court at the October term for a final decision.

LAFOLLETTE IS RENOMINATED FOR THE SENATE

MICH. SENATOR IS DEFEATED IN THE PRIMARIES

WANTS BETTER LAWS FOR WORKINGMEN

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 6.—John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers, in a Labor day address here, spoke in favor of better laws for the protection of workingmen. "A well-known writer," said Mr. Mitchell, asserts that 500,000 workingmen are killed or maimed annually in the United States.

"That means that more lives are sacrificed and more workingmen are injured each year in the peaceful conduct of our industries than were sacrificed in any one year in the civil war."
