## CURTISS BEAT BY ENGLISHMAN IN SPEED TEST

BOSTON, Sept. 15.—Driving his Blériot monoplane approximately a mile a minute, Claude Grahame White, the English aviator, brought to a successful close his American engagement, defeating Glen Curtiss, the American aviator, for the world's speed championship in a special match speed test on the Harvard aviation field. White defeated Curtiss sixteen and three-fifths seconds in a five and a quarter mile race. He won the three thousand-dollar Harvard cup and made a new speed mark, going the course in five minutes, forty-seven and four-fifths seconds.

### FICKERT MAKES RAID ON BARBARY COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—In pursuance of the policy outlined by him yesterday in a letter to Chief of Police Martin, in which he declared that unless the police put a stop to the violation of the law in the tenderloin he would himself take a hand in the matter, District Attorney Fickert, accompanied by several deputies this morning made a raid on the dives of the Barbary Coast. Invading some of the more lawless places, the district attorney made several arrests of proprietors whom he found allowing dancing and music after 1 a. m., and in resorts where minors were allowed to dance and buy liquor.

It is believed that this action of Fickert, so closely following his declaration of war on the proprietors of tenderloin dives, will have the effect of making the police enforce the law to the letter in the future.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT OF SAN FRANCISCO NEEDS REORGANIZING

## COUNTERFEITER MAKES CONFESSION TO OFFICERS

UTICA, N. Y., Sept. 15.—Confessing that he has coined many thousand spurious five-cent pieces, a man giving his name as George Corrigan of Columbus, O., is lodged in the local jail in charge of secret service men. He was arrested at Cooperstown.

Corrigan lived on the shore of Otsego lake all summer in a little hut, posing as a camper. His place was raided by government agents and found to contain dies, a hand press, metal and a quantity of newly-made nickels. He admitted he had been doing the work himself and said he was getting ready to make quarter-dollars.

## Illinois Primaries Also Show That Lee O'Neil Browne Is Also Renominated A Member of Legislature.

CHICAGO, Sept. 15.—The renomination of Speaker Cannon by a reduced plurality, and the probable defeat of Congressman George Foss by his progressive opponent, indicated in the early returns, were the features of today's primaries in Illinois. The renomination of Lee O'Neil Browne to the state house of representatives was also indicated. Brown was recently acquitted of a charge of having bribed a state representative to vote for Senator Lorimer. In the eleventh congressional district George Conn, Jr., is probably victorious over Iva Copley by a small majority. Conn is said to have been backed by the standpat element, while his opponent declared himself a progressive. The closeness of the fight in the

tenth district came as a surprise to most of the students of the campaign. While Foss, who is chairman of the committee on naval affairs, always voted with the regulars at Washington, he stated in his campaign speeches that he had informed Cannon he felt free to reserve his judgment as to how he should vote in the next speaker-ship contest. G. P. Englehardt, who campaigned on an unmistakable progressive platform, and attacked the present congressman on his record on the tariff and as a supporter of Cannon rules, defeated H. S. Boutell, after many years in congress. The regular Republican organization refused to endorse Boutell on the grounds of his record as a standpatter, would insure Democratic success if he was nominated.

## ROOSEVELT DEFINES POLITICAL CREED OF NEW NATIONALISM

### Denies That He Is Talking Revolution Nor Does His Doctrine Call for Mob Rule—Scores Corrupt Corporations.

OYSTER BAY, Sept. 15.—Roosevelt said today he was not talking of revolution in declaring his new political creed. Neither is he making it appear mob rule. In a staunch defense of his doctrine of "new nationalism" he declared he was merely urging the application of old moralities to modern conditions. At the same time, he replied to those who have op-

posed him. He denounced the newspapers which, he said, had attacked honest public men. The colonel's address was delivered at the Suffolk county fair at Riverhead, R. I. The colonel's exposition of "new nationalism" came at the close of a speech in which he denounced dishonest corporations, dishonest men of wealth, and political bosses. He made no reference to the New York political situation.

## IN FAVOR OF DIRECT ELECTION OF SENATORS

## PASTOR QUILTS TO JOIN THE RANKS OF THE SOCIALISTS

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 15.—William Thurston Brown, former pastor of a Unitarian church, became a martyr to the cause of "free speech" this evening. He was arrested while he was speaking on the street and booked at the police station on a charge of obstructing the sidewalk. He was released on \$100 bail.

Six Socialist labor speakers who were arrested last night will be tried tomorrow for obstructing traffic. The use of the streets for speaking has never been restricted until recently. Brown has written a number of Socialist pamphlets. He resigned the pastorate of his church to devote his time entirely to the Socialist propaganda.

## AEROPLANE MAY BE DEMONSTRATED AT MANEUVERS

CAMP ATASCADERO, Sept. 15.—The first day of army maneuvers which began today under Brigadier General Tasker Bliss, was spent by the regulars settling in camp and by the officers familiarizing themselves with the topography of the country over which the field of operations will take place.

Sixteen officers were detailed as umpires to observe the operations of troops and to render decisions of the "war game" between the "red" and "blue" forces. Tomorrow morning the troops will move into the field for the first operations. An effort is being made to interest some of the amateur aviators of the state to make aeroplane flights at the camp to demonstrate their practicability for military purposes.

## DEMOCRATS OF NEW JERSEY ARE IN SESSION

## CALEB POWERS IS BEAT BY A LARGE MAJORITY AT PRIMARY ELECTION

### Sought Republican Nomination for Congressman From Kentucky—Was Accused of Murdering Gov. Gobel.

LONDON, Ky., Sept. 15.—By a decisive majority of more than 7,000 Caleb Powers was defeated for congressman by Don Edwards for the Republican nomination for representative from the eleventh Congressional district of Kentucky in the primary election today. Edwards is serving his third term. Powers made the race upon an appeal to the voters of the district to give him the nomination as a

"vindication" of his alleged complicity in the assassination of Governor Goebel in 1900. Powers, who was secretary of state at the time of the assassination, was confined in jail eight years, the first three trials resulting in convictions and the fourth in a disagreement. Last year Governor Wilson swept the court records clear of all cases remaining untried in connection with the Goebel murder by granting pardons to Powers and several others.
