

REPUBLICANS TO HOLD CONVENTION ON OCTOBER 1

COUNTY COMMITTEEMEN MET YESTERDAY AND SELECTED OFFICERS.

Pursuant to the primary election law the county committeemen of the republican party met yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the court house and then adjourned to the rooms of the Republican Club. There were present, either in person or proxy, R. B. Govan, first Tonopah precinct; Cal Shaw, second Tonopah precinct; P. S. Booth, third Tonopah precinct; J. A. Falkenstein, fourth Tonopah precinct; W. S. Johnson, Manhattan; W. R. Gibson, Round Mountain, and E. R. Clemens, Rhyolite.

R. B. Govan was selected as chairman, and P. S. Booth as secretary. The first important business to come up for consideration was the selection of an executive committee to manage the affairs of the coming campaign. For this important office R. B. Govan, P. S. Booth and Cal Shaw were chosen.

It was decided to levy the following assessments against the republican county candidates, which will be used as a campaign fund:

District judge, \$400; sheriff and assessor, \$200; district attorney, \$150; recorder and auditor, \$150; county treasurer, \$150; county clerk, \$150; commissioner (long term), \$75; commissioner (short term), \$50; assemblymen, each, \$25; justice of the peace, Tonopah township, \$75; constable, Tonopah township, \$75; public administrator, \$10.

Regular headquarters will be established in the Brougher-Govan block in front of the quarters now occupied by the Republican club. It was also decided that a convention of the Nye county republican candidates be held on Saturday morning, October 1, 1910, for the purpose of adopting a county platform and transacting such other business as may come up for discussion.
