SOUTHERN PACIFIC MAY EXTEND OWENS VALLEY LINE THROUGH TO IDAHO POINTS

The opening of the door of the Owens River valley during the forthcoming year recalls the fact that this latest route to and from the coast is the oldest in existence. But it is a mistake to say the Southern Pacific is going to utilize the Hazen gateway, which would prove an expensive proposition by swinging too far to the west and north when a better outlet is available through Battle Mountain. The newspapers of Los Angeles maintain that Hazen Junction is the only way of escape, but the railroad editors of that place apparently close their eyes to the handwriting on the wall that has been conspicuous for the past two years. The Southern Pacific is working out a comprehensive plan for a north and south line that will reach from Los Angeles to tidewater to all points in Idaho, emerging from the north at Fernley, Nevada, when an easy grade to the northwest has been surveyed. Contractors are busy on the first hundred miles of the line and, it is hinted, that they have been promised a bonus for beating the maturity of their contracts. This is another reason why the Owens Valley line should not go 200 miles out of the way, especially as the route proposes to compete with the Western Pacific for through traffic from the south. The old Sacramento route over the Sierras presents too many physical difficulties to be entertained any longer, as the trunk line for the orange traffic of

the southern end of the state which is patronizing the San Pedro route more freely every day. So long as the Harriman interests control 51 per cent of the stock of the Salt Lake line, the diversion of traffic will not be seriously felt but the management of the Southern Pacific is looking far into the future with the intention of capturing every strategic point.

Pioneers came through Owens valley before the Civil war. There was a rush through there when gold was discovered in Mono county. Settlers came pouring into the valley all during the five years of war in face of Indian hostilities and the history of Inyo and Mono counties is filled with accounts of savage barbarity of the Plutes. When the Cerro Gordo mine was opened at Keeler, on the shores of Owens lake, a freight wagon route was operated to San Pedro and the coast, whence ores were shipped around the Horn to Swansea. The Nadeau family of Los Angeles reared the foundations of its immense fortune packing ore to San Pedro and bringing back provisions for the miners at Cerro Gordo. The Southern Pacific will utilize the narrow gauge railroad, built by D. O. Mills, to reach the soda beds of Owens lake and which he afterwards described as 200 miles too long and 300 years too soon. This will bring the new short line to Sodaville, whence it will swing due north through the Reese River valley and down to Battle Mountain.

MINING CONGRESS GOES AFTER THE FAKER

The American Mining congress, in session at Los Angeles, has instituted a plan with the laudable object in view of protecting mining investors from the parasites of the mining world—fake promoters.

The organization is officered by men of integrity and of high standing in the communities from which they come, and that they have the best interests of the mining industry at heart goes without saying. The organization is thoroughly earnest in its efforts to secure legislation which will put a stop to operations based upon nothing stronger than torrid air. To place mining upon an investment basis at the expense of speculative is one of the purposes of the congress. In addition to preventing, if possible, dishonest ventures, it will go far to assist in the prosecution of known fake promoters.

May Change Law.

In many of the sessions of the mining congress this subject has been discussed at considerable length, and many valuable points have been obtained through committees which have made the subject one of extensive investigation. It is believed that at the present session in Los Angeles the law which the congress managed to have enacted will be changed so as to more effectually reach and eliminate the faker, and to have this law adopted by every state in the Union.

The Present Law.

"Any person who knowingly makes or publishes in any way whatever, or knowingly permits to be so made or published, any book, notice, report, statement, exhibit or other publication of or concerning the affairs, pecuniary condition or property of any corporation, joint stock association, co-partnership or individual, which said book, prospectus, notice, report, statement, exhibit or other publication shall contain any statement which is false or which is willfully or fraudulently exaggerated or which is intended to give or which shall have a tendency to give to the public generally or to any person a less or greater apparent value to the shares, bonds or property of said corporation, joint stock association, co-partnership or individual, than said shares, bonds or property or any part thereof shall be deemed or in fact possess, shall be really guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be imprisoned for not more than five years or fined not more than \$5,000, or shall suffer both such imprisonment and fine."


