

## BOB POHL HAS MADE A RECORD AS COUNTY CLERK

HAS CONDUCTED AFFAIRS OF HIS OFFICE IN BUSINESS-LIKE MANNER

One of the busiest men in town these days is Robert G. Pohl, county clerk, who is a candidate on the republican ticket for re-election. On his office falls the work of preparing for the elections and already many of the details are being arranged and looked after. Prior to the primaries Mr. Pohl labored day and night and the election went off without a hitch. Should anything go wrong, he is to blame and in accordance every little detail receives his personal attention.

BEREAVED FAMILY ACCOMPANY REMAINS THIS MORNING TO COLORADO

As a consequence two special trained nurses were employed and the patient was removed to a private room in the hospital, that he might receive every possible advantage in his fatal struggle with the dread disease.

## REGISTRATION BOOKS CLOSED AS PER SCHEDULE

TOTAL OF 1438 NAMES ENROLLED—SLIGHT DECREASE SINCE TWO YEARS AGO

At 9 o'clock last night Judge H. H. Atkinson, registry agent for Tonopah, breathed a sigh of relief. At that hour the registration books were closed and the last total showed that 1438 names had been recorded. This was divided up as follows: First precinct, 396; second precinct, 330; third precinct, 373; fourth precinct, 339.

This year's registration is about 300 short of that of two years ago, which totaled about 1735. It was greatly in excess of the primaries, for only 400 names then appeared on the register. But for the primaries those who had registered two years ago were not compelled to do so again.

The registration books are now closed to those who failed to place their names on any register book in the state, but voters desiring to transfer from or to any precinct in the state can do so up until the day of election. On this account it is expected that the total of 1438 will be increased considerably.

## MAY SECURE OLD PAINTING OF GOVERNOR NYE

TWO PAINTINGS HAVE BEEN LOCATED IN CARSON CITY BY WALTER COLE

Hon. Hugh Brown yesterday received a letter from Walter Cole, who is in Carson assisting in the compilation of the statutes of this state, in which it was stated that there were two paintings of former Governor Nye in the capital city. Mr. Cole urged that some action be taken by the citizens of Nye county to procure one of the paintings, which could be hung in the court house here. This county was named after Governor Nye, who was one of the first governors of the state, and afterwards represented Nevada in the United States senate.

One of the paintings is the property of Mr. Yerington, of Carson, and it is thought that it could be secured. It is the intention of Mr. Brown to bring the matter to the attention of the Nye County Bar association and other prominent residents of the county. Should the picture be secured it will be hung in the court house with befitting ceremonies.
