## GOOD FOR VOTERS.

In discussing the candidacies of Nixon and Pittman, for the United States senate, the Yerington Times, in part, has the following to say:

"What of Key Pittman, his opponent? Well, what of him? What has he done that entitles him to support for the office of United States senator? Just name one thing that distinguishes him from his fellows before he decided to run for the senatorship. Get down to brass tacks and give a logical reason for so honoring him that will bear inspection."

Continuing, the article says on behalf of T. L. Oddie:

"Oddie has the confidence of moneyed men in the east, who know he has always given them a square deal, and his election will go a long way toward restoring the confidence of investors in this state. He has also given the union miners a square deal. To Oddie more than any other man is due the fact that every miner in Nevada gets a high rate of wages. It is not too high by any means, but it would doubtless be lower but for the stand Oddie took in the early days of Tonopah."

"The men who were forming the first miners' union decided to ask for a minimum of \$3.50 per day. Oddie, as general manager of the big company, said: 'I will make a minimum of \$4.00 per day.'"

"The union miners of Nevada should never forget that when Oddie was putting in a day's shift in the mines with them he was their friend; when he was a millionaire he was the same friend, and now that he is again broke, he still shows the same loyalty to them."

## BUSINESS VS. BUNCOMBE.

Senator Oddie is making a splendid campaign on the issue of the restoration of business confidence. Nevada is one of the latest of the states to have her natural resources exploited, but no state, not excepting Colorado, has suffered more at the hands of the demagogue and the financial buccaneer than the state of Nevada. She has untold wealth only waiting to be called from its hiding place, only waiting the investment of the capital necessary for development. The man primarily interested is the laboring man; capital has a thousand other avenues of investment and occupation. The demagogue, as usual, has sounded a warning by the customary attitude of hostility. The wildcatter has planted the seed of suspicion. They are the twin enemies of the state.

The demagogue has left a trail of devastation through several states, notably Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado. All are on the road to recovery, but after what a sacrifice! The trail of the wildcatter is still visible in Colorado and Nevada and both are seeking to regain the confidence that was lost.

What Nevada wants is a fixed, progressive business policy that will give confidence to the men whose confidence is worth having. The demagogue never did anything for anybody but himself. He is the curse of every state that has suffered misfortune, for on the misfortunes of others he seems to thrive best. Nevada may require time to oust him, but his time is coming.

"The devil was sick, the devil a monk would be; the devil was well, the devil a monk was he." This old adage applies very forcibly to the Dickerson-Sprague combine which is soliciting votes of the radical labor element on the pretext that they are friends of the cause. Dickerson hung up the state police bill only until a rider was incorporated appointing him commissary general with a salary of \$1200 a year and traveling expenses that have come in handy. Sprague was chief lobbyist for the state police bill and spent three weeks at the special session in Carson working for the passage of the measure.

A close observer who has been devoting a good deal of time to the political situation ventures the remark that Sprague will not receive twenty votes in Eureka county. This is due to the feelings of the citizens who were robbed of their money placed in the Eureka bank which was allowed to continue in business two years after it was known to be insolvent. This is an indication of the sentiment against the banking board which will also have to answer to the people of Rhyolite for the looting of a bank in Nye county.

Eureka, within twelve months, has suffered the loss of a railroad, washouts that marooned the county and closed down the leading low-grade mines, but the severest blow of all was the failure of the Eureka bank, which contained over a million dollars, representing the savings of a lifetime deposited by the stockmen, miners, lumbermen, ranchers, wool-growers and merchants. The bank had been insolvent for two years and was permitted to remain open through the courtesy of the Dickerson banking board.

"The position of commissary of state police was saddled on me despite my protest," says Governor Dickerson. Senator Jas. Boyd, a democratic member of the last assembly, has the records which show that Dickerson opposed the measure only until he was provided with a salary of \$1200 per annum and traveling expenses. Then he withdrew all opposition.

Free lead put another nail in the coffin of the Dickerson candidates when Senator Nixon took the stand at Eureka Saturday night. Eureka has suffered almost every form of calamity during the past year but if the Dickerson ticket should win the miners feel that they might as well close up and seek a living elsewhere.
