

FIND BODY OF AN AGED WOMAN IN VACANT LOT

Beaten Almost Beyond Recognition--San Francisco Police Arrest Ex-Convict Who Is Charged With the Crime.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—Beaten almost beyond recognition, the dead body of Mrs. Julia Cary, 85 years old, was found in a vacant lot adjoining the Savoy theatre, today, in the heart of the business district.

John Knapp, an ex-convict employed in a stable fifteen feet away, was arrested on suspicion. A blood stained window weight to which clung strands of knotted gray hair was found in his room. Knapp had recently changed his blood-stained

clothing. The body was identified by the matron at the city prison, who said the dead woman had been imprisoned frequently for petty offenses. Knapp denied his guilt.

SAN JOSE, Nov. 14.—The mother of Knapp is alive at her home here. Despite the identification of the corpse, the detectives assert that a photograph found in Knapp's room is that of the dead woman.

Knapp served thirteen years at Folsom for the murder of James Quinn of Humboldt county in a gambling quarrel.

AMERICAN FEDERATION AT ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 14.—The thirtieth convention of the American Federation of Labor began here today and will continue for two weeks. The morning session was devoted to welcoming the delegates and honorary guests, some of whom were from England. At the afternoon session the reports of Samuel Gompers, president, and Frank Morrison, secretary, and John B. Lennon, treasurer, were read. The credentials and resolutions committees will report late this afternoon.

During the opening addresses of the convention jeers greeted the name of Cannon, while loud applause welcomed mention of the name of Champ Clark.

DEATH OF ED COMERFORD

Edwin C. Comerford, a well known resident of this city, died suddenly Friday afternoon at the family residence in the north end of town. He had been suffering from tuberculosis but had been able to be around until Thursday, when he grew worse and rapidly failed until the time of his death.

Deceased was a talented young man and a writer of much ability, several poems written by him being of a high order. He was at one time a student of Santa Clara college and later attended the Nevada university and was a member of the T. H. P. O. fraternity. While at Santa Clara college he was the literary editor of Redwood, the college magazine, and in addition to his talents as a writer he showed artistic ideas as a pen and ink cartoonist and in sketches. Despite his illness he was always of a cheerful disposition and his untimely demise is deeply regretted by scores of friends. He was a native of Tombstone, Ariz., aged 25 years, and is survived by a father, mother, brother and sister. A sad feature of his death is the fact that his father and mother were in Canada, where the latter has been quite ill, and they will be unable to come home to attend the funeral.—Territorial Enterprise.

FEDERAL LAND OFFICE REVOKES WITHDRAWAL

HAS LEG AMPUTATED AT MINERS' HOSPITAL

John Camp, the miner who was brought up from Rhyolite Saturday suffering from a fractured leg, sustained an operation today and had the limb amputated. Camp met with an accident seven weeks ago while working in the Montgomery-Shoshone mine and refused to be brought here for treatment until it was too late to save his leg. The operation was successful and late reports are to the effect that he stood the ordeal in fine shape. Dr. E. S. Grigsby performed the surgical operation.

GOVERNOR ADAMS LEAVES FOR THE ORIENT

Last evening Governor Adams and wife left for San Francisco, where they will take a steamer for the Orient. The governor and his wife expect to remain at least six months in that interesting portion of the globe. They will visit the South Sea Islands, Australia, New Zealand and the Japanese and Chinese possessions. Both have resided in Nevada for an ordinary lifetime and the trip is taken both for recreation and health.

The governor will spend considerable time investigating sheep culture in Australia, as his possessions in that line are the heaviest of any individual in this state. Their many friends wish them a successful trip.—Carson Appeal.

HOW PATRONAGE WILL BE DIVIDED

With the election of Baker as attorney-general and Brodigan as secretary of state, the board of prison commissioners and board of control of the orphans' home will both be democratic. The commissioners of the Nevada hospital for mental diseases will be republican.

The president of the senate during the coming session of the legislature will be Gilbert C. Ross, democratic lieutenant-governor.

The board of capital commissioners will consist of Oddie, Eggers, Brodigan and McMillan, a republican board. The board of immigration will be democratic. The railroad commission board will be democratic.

JAPAN PREPARING TO ENACT FACTORY LAW

Japan is preparing a factory law to be brought before the diet at the next session. The bill will prohibit employment of children under 12 years of age, and those under 16 will not be permitted to work more than 12 hours a day. For every 10 hours' work an hour of rest must be given, and a half-hour in every six hours. For those who work at night, four days' holiday each month must be given. This is the fourth bill drafted, the others having been thrown out, and it is intended to apply to all factories employing over ten hands.

PROMISING DISCOVERY IN DELAMAR

Bringing along with him a carload of high grade ore from the famous old Delamar mine below Pioche, in Lincoln county, D. D. Finley, an old Cripple Creek miner, is now in Salt Lake and will remain there until he gets returns from his ore, probably next Monday, says the Herald. Mr. Finley has a lease on a part of the old property. On this ground he discovered right at the surface what evidently was an important ore body. This is not far from old workings with shafts down over 1000 feet. His work has been confined to surface trenchings and during the past three months he has taken out two carloads of ore, the first of which is now at the Salt Lake samplers. Mr. Finley did not care to tell how rich is his ore, but he admitted it justified an expensive wagon haul of thirty-one miles to the railroad.
