

## KILLED AFTER A RUNNING FIGHT OF TWO MILES

### Carl Flash Was Killed After Giving Battle to Two Officers From Lander County— Was Wanted on Larceny Charge.

Under Sheriff W. J. Wilson has received additional information regarding the killing of Carl Flash near Bowler's ranch last week. Just after the homicide, the sheriff and district attorney of Lander county communicated with Judge Atkinson here and stated that Flash was killed while resisting arrest. Judge Foley of Round Mountain was sent out to hold an inquest, but so far he has not made a report to the district attorney here.

Wilson, in conversation with Sheriff Ryan, of Lander county, over the telephone, learned that two deputies had been sent out to arrest Flash on a larceny charge. When the deputies approached, Flash opened fire on them. A running battle was kept up for over two miles. Both officers and fugitive were on horseback with the latter leading an extra horse. Flash had one of his horses killed and shortly afterwards was shot himself. It turned out that neither of the horses belonged to him, both having been stolen.

## HAYES AFTER GOMPERS' SCALP AS PRESIDENT

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 15—Governor Hadley of Missouri addressed the delegates to the American Federation of Labor convention today on "Workmen's Compensation." It was the only set speech of the day. President Gompers continued reading his report which was begun yesterday afternoon. Other business included filing of reports by various committees. Before the convention ends the delegates, according to leaders, will have to decide for or against socialism. Victor L. Berger of Milwaukee, and Congressman-elect Max Hayes of Cleveland are the leaders of a faction which will make an effort to have the convention declare for socialism. The friends of Hayes would like to see him succeed Gompers to the presidency of the federation.

The report of the executive council recommended that a charter be issued to the Western Federation of Miners. It is announced that the delegates of the machinists will oppose the recommendation.

## RUIN MONITOR IN ORDER TO TEST HIGH EXPLOSIVE

## BIG SMUGGLING STEAL ON MEXICAN BORDER

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 15—Culdad Jaurez, Mexico, is torn by the disclosure of wholesale smuggling in which government officials are implicated. Special inspectors from Mexico City today caused the arrest of Chief Inspector Padres, who has been in charge of the customs service here for several years. Simultaneously twelve inspectors disappeared and cannot be found today. It is claimed that the Mexican government has been defrauded out of thousands of dollars monthly through dishonest inspectors.

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## MURDERER OF TENNESSEE SENATOR IS ACQUITTED

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 15—Robin Cooper, charged with the murder of Senator E. W. Carmack, was found not guilty today. On the recommendation of the attorney-general Judge Neil instructed the jury to return a verdict of acquittal, a former sentence of conviction having been reversed by the supreme court. Colonel Cooper, the father of Robin, was convicted of the same crime, but in his case the judgment was affirmed by the supreme tribunal.

## MEXICANS ARE HEADED FOR HAPPY HUNTING GROUND

The people of this section are so anxious for a combat with the Mexicans that they will probably start on a march this afternoon to meet the alleged invaders.
