### NEVADA DIVORCE CONSTRUED BY A CARSON LAWYER

ALFRED CHARTZ GIVES VIEWS ON SUBJECT OF GENERAL INTEREST

As I read and construe the law, it is utterly impossible for persons married in the state of New York to obtain a legal divorce, free of encumbrances, in the state of Nevada, or in any other state in the union, than within the state of New York itself—unless the parties to the action appear in court and in good faith contest the same. As I further construe the law, such divorces are good everywhere, except in the state of New York, and children born of remarriages after such divorces are legitimate everywhere except in the state of New York, and the moment they step within the boundaries of the state of New York they are bastards, and their property rights are limited to the rights of bastards to all property situate within that state, and their parents who step within the boundaries immediately become bigamists, and subject to prosecution for that crime, although should they keep within one foot of the boundary line they would remain within the pale of the law, and be considered decently married husband and wife, their children considered perfectly legitimate. Thus, under the peculiar laws of the several states of the union, we find a boy or girl a bastard in New York and legitimate everywhere else in the world, and we find a man or woman guilty of bigamy in New York innocent everywhere else.

The foregoing statement of facts, if correctly stated, calls for radical legislation. I suggest that congress should take the first step, and that every state in the union should follow in its steps, to the end that we would thus obtain uniform laws, and establish uniform rights. I cannot in a short article suggest all the rights and wrongs suggested to my mind, and herein simply attempt to suggest a plan.

As a matter of illustration, it may be proper to recall the divorce case of William E. Corey, president of the United States Trust company. He induced his wife to obtain a divorce from him at Reno. She fled her complaint, resided at Reno and all around for six months. She was constantly attended by lawyers employed and paid for by her husband, and by other attendants to see that she did not "welch" or "renig." He employed and paid for her attorneys, and employed and paid for his own. She was constantly under surveillance by his employees. She did not "welch," but testified as instructed, and she got her divorce as he wanted it. He did not appear, but his attorneys asked only such questions as would help the plaintiff to obtain the divorce that he wanted.

I cannot conceive, under the evidence, that there remained a single badge of collusive fraud that could be perpetrated upon the court, and that every fraud that could be perpetrated upon the court was perpetrated, and, under the law as I construe it, the decree of divorce as therein granted is absolutely null and void, and can be set aside, and upon its being set aside the first wife and her property rights must be restored as though no divorce had ever been granted.

We thus find William Ellis Corey a bigamist in New York whenever he steps within its boundaries, and with but one wife the moment he steps out of its boundaries, leaving him the balance of the world for freedom.

However, any property he may leave on his death situate within the jurisdiction of the state of New York will remain subject to the rights of his first wife and her heirs just as though she was his only relict.

### WAS A RICH MAN ONCE BUT DIES IN POVERTY

LEW CARPENTER MADE AND LOST SEVERAL FORTUNES IN NEVADA

Deserted by fortune and passed up by many of his old acquaintances, Lewis Carpenter, formerly a prominent race horse owner during the early days of Nevada, and a man of much wealth, died in poverty this morning at the county hospital at the age of 73 years, says the Ely Expositor of Monday.

The exact cause of his death is not known. The last days of the pioneer were marked with poverty and pain. He had been in failing health for the last four years, and his death was not unexpected.

It was realized for several days that his shattered condition could not stay the ravages of death, and he answered the last summons, with no friends or relatives to bid him a last farewell.

As his eyes were closed in death, Carpenter could recall with anguish and remorse the things that might have been, and bring back to his recollections the days of his former prosperity, when he wielded considerable influence in the racing circles in Nevada thirty years ago.

Although he was said to have possessed considerable means at one time, his assets slipped away from him, and during his declining years he lived through the assistance of friends. Dollars contributed by those who knew him well saved him from the potter's field. His intimate associates would not permit him to lie in a nameless grave.

The funeral will occur Monday afternoon from the undertaking parlors of Nevin & Graham, where the body is being prepared for burial. The remains will be allowed to rest in eternal sleep among many of his old cronies who have long been numbered among the absent.

The deceased was a native of Canada. He drifted into Nevada forty years ago, when the rich mineral discoveries were attracting from all parts of the world. Carpenter owned a number of fast horses in the early days, and it is said that he accumulated a good deal of money from his race track winnings. He has resided in White Pine county for twenty-five years. He never relinquished his interest in race horses until three years ago when ill health prevented him from participating in his favorite sport.

His only known relative is a sister, Mrs. Martha McGillroy of Harrisburg, Ontario. She was notified by telegraph today of her brother's death.

#### VOTE TO EXTEND THE N-C-O TO LAKEVIEW

The stockholders of the N-C-O railroad have voted to extend the line to Lakeview, Ore., the construction work to begin immediately. Ultimately the terminus of the road will be at The Dalles, Ore., giving the company a total mileage of 500, as against 184 at present. General Manager Dunway voted the shares held in the east.

### FILIPINOS ARE NOT READY FOR INDEPENDENCE

SECRETARY DICKINSON SEES NO HOPE FOR PRESENT GENERATION

Secretary of War Dickinson, who recently made a visit to the Philippines, has just issued an extensive report on his trip. During the secretary's stay on the islands, from July 27 to Sept. 3, he inspected practically all the public institutions and army posts and held many public hearings. The administration of the various departments were found to be in a generally satisfactory condition.

The secretary speaks very sympathetically of the aspirations of the Filipino people for independence and says that the public expression is very general in favor of the same, but that many of the conservative and most substantial men would view such a result with consternation.

Referring to the fitness of the Filipino people for self-government, he says:

"There are very many highly educated Filipinos—many men of talent, ability and brilliancy—but the percentage in comparison with those who are wholly untrained in an understanding of, and the exercise of, political rights under a republican form of government is so small, and under the best and most rapid development possible under existing conditions will for a long period continue so small, that it is a delusion, if the present policy of control of the islands by the American people shall continue, to encourage the Filipino people in the hope that the administration of the islands will be turned over to them within the time of the present generation."

Secretary Dickinson states that peace, law and order prevail in all parts of the islands. Ladrone or robber bands are almost if not entirely suppressed and the head-hunting tribes of Bonto, who a year ago were engaged in taking heads, are now devoting themselves to agriculture and other peaceful pursuits and enjoying the comforts of life. All the wild tribes are beginning to see and appreciate what is being done for them.

A very deep and widespread interest is being manifested in education on the part of the young and old and the burden of taxation for education is cheerfully borne. Good progress is being made in learning the English language.

The secretary dwells at some length upon his investigations relative to the recent sale of friar lands, which was given much notoriety in the last session of congress and the public press, but found no basis for the extreme statements then made.

The financial condition of the islands is very satisfactory, there being a surplus of \$6,394,793.56.

The Agricultural bank appears not to have been of the assistance to the agriculturists which was anticipated from its creation. This has been due to various reasons, principal of which is defective titles to property offered as security. Of the 565 applications for loans 453 were refused, principally on account of defective titles. The total money loaned up to June 30, 1910, aggregated \$142,225.

An inspection of the railroads shows them to be well constructed and well maintained with rolling stock and equipment in first-rate condition, and the companies were making every effort to promote agricultural progress along their lines. The number of miles of road now in operation by the Philippine Railway company is 362, with construction work progressing as rapidly as possible.

The statement of exports and imports shows that the foreign business of the islands has greatly increased since 1907.
