### GOVERNOR ODDIE PASSES UP THE BUCK TO THEM

#### GOVERNOR HAS PUT UP HIS ULTIMATUM TO THE PRESENT LEGISLATORS.

Governor Oddie sent the following ultimatum to both houses of the legislature, and they will now have to acquiesce in his requests or else block the much-needed legislation: "To the Honorable Senate and Assembly:

"Senate bill No. 28, providing for a water law for the state of Nevada, was amended in the senate so as to place the state engineer's department of the state government under the control and as a perquisite of the lieutenant governor and secretary of state.

"I desire to inform your honorable body that if the bill is not amended in this respect by restoring the appointive power to the governor, where it rightfully belongs, it will be vetoed. In such event it will be necessary to make provision in the general appropriation bill for an appropriation sufficient to carry on the office of state engineer, as now created, until another legislature meets.

### NINE MINUTES' TIME FRENCH BID NOT LIVE

PARIS, March 15.—Starting exactly at midnight Friday, time was annihilated in France for the space of nine minutes and twenty-one seconds. On the stroke of the hour all clocks in the republic were stopped for the period indicated in order to comply with the law making the time the same in all places within a radius of fifteen degrees, and regulating it from the meridian of Greenwich, England. All railway trains, if on time, were held up, while those behind schedule were allowed to make up the difference. The new time will not be used at the wireless stations for signaling ships until June 30th next.

Owing to the change in time, an interesting question has arisen. It is questionable if a child that is born and dies within the elapsed time will have ever legally lived. This point is puzzling all the lawyers.

### MOTHER WILL NOW CLAIM THE REWARD

Mrs. C. A. White of Anderson, California, mother of Deputy Sheriff Ed Hogle, of Modoc county, who was killed in the battle between the posse and the Indian murderers near Kelley's creek, will present a claim for her son's share of the \$9200 reward offered for the capture of the outlaws.

Hogle joined the posse at Eagleville, and although he lost his official authority when he crossed the line into Nevada, kept on in the case and was the only one of the party killed.

The reward offered jointly by the state of Nevada, Miller and Lux, Cambron Cattle company and others, aggregates \$9200. Mrs. White figures that each man's share is approximately \$1200 and will present a claim for that amount.

#### HERE AND THERE.

A Massachusetts clergyman turns in a bill against an estate for \$300 for prayers offered six weeks in succession for the benefit of the deceased. The Goldfield Tribune thinks this is a good example of Yankee thrift.

Thursday is the last legislative day of the present session, and the eight-hour day is being disregarded by the solons this week in the effort to clear the slate. No one questions the wisdom of the statute limiting the length of the sessions to 60 days.

State Engineer Boyle places himself in a strong position by resigning. Rather than jeopardize the new irrigation legislation, which is recognized as good legislation, he steps down and out, thus eliminating the political issue that has been raised in the senate.

The new Virginia City mining school bill that is now up to the governor to sign contains provisions for greatly improving the equipment of the school for more effective work in the laboratory and science. It will greatly increase the efficiency of the work.

It looks as if the assembly would pass the capitol removal bill, which will place the matter up to the people to decide. The state is in no financial condition to undertake such a radical move at this time, and we do not believe the voters of the state will stand for it.

#### SHERIFF FERREL HAS FOUND NO CLEWS

No clues have appeared thus far to show either the circumstances attendant on the escape of A. F. Cunningham from the Reno county jail, or his present whereabouts. Sheriff Ferrel declares that he has investigated every clew furnished him or suggested by anyone, but with no success.

### REDUCTION IN THE PRICE OF BERTHS HAS LITTLE EFFECT

CHICAGO, March 15.—Although reduced Pullman berth rates have been in effect since February 1, passenger traffic officials on lines entering Chicago declare that there has been no appreciable increase in the demand for upper berths, the price for which was lessened to 80 per cent of lower berth rates.

It was believed at first that the cut in tolls by the Pullman company would be eagerly taken advantage of by the traveling public. Reports received at the Pullman offices and observations made by officers in the passenger departments of various railroads, however, are to the effect that lower berths, with comparatively few exceptions, still are asked for.

A number of passenger traffic managers yesterday expressed the opinion that the public generally has not been fully acquainted as yet with the fact that upper berth rates are cheaper than those for lowers, and that it will be several months before this information has been fully disseminated.

#### MINER SUFFERING FROM BROKEN SPINE

Suffering from a broken spine, James Walker, a Goldfield miner, was taken to Reno Monday on train No. 23 and taken on the limited to Rochester, Minn., where there is a famous specialist on spine troubles.
