

# TONOPAH DAILY BONANZA

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### ROOSEVELT GRILLS DIVORCE.

Theodore Roosevelt has visited Reno. There he has talked and talked plain. His remarks about the "divorce evil" were short, but pointed. He issued little truths that should be taken to heart by the people of Reno and by the people of the entire state. Mr. Roosevelt simply reflects, in his remarks, the opinion that is general throughout the east and throughout Europe relative to the fester-spot of Nevada.

The colonel said: "And now I want to wish you success in tackling the divorce evil. If there is one colony, the existence of which ought to be discouraged, it is the colony of people who come here to establish a residence only to get rid of their duty towards those to whom it should be their special duty to do their duty. I don't mean to comment on your own divorces among people of your own state, but you should keep the others out! The wealth that such a colony brings in is no advantage. You cannot afford to have that kind of money spent."

Food for thought a-plenty is those few terse sentences. "The wealth that such a colony brings in is no advantage." While he did not specifically state that he thought so, it is most evident that Mr. Roosevelt regards this coin as "blood money." The same manner of coin as that which was paid to Judas for the betrayal of the Christ. We of Nevada know this to be a fact. We know that the price paid is far too much for the returns. We know that Reno prospers in filthy lucre at the expense of the seat of learning of Nevada. We know that self-respecting mothers and fathers prefer to send their young hopefuls to colleges in the east and in California rather than have them associated with the plague of Reno. We know that the University of Nevada is doomed to decay, provided the ulcer which effects Reno is not speedily abolished.

Those who have read and studied ancient history can readily draw a parallel between our own fair country and the republics of the olden days that have long since gone down into un-honored history as a result of just such practices. Not only the ancients but the great empires of medieval times rotted away from the core out. It was not invading armies or powers that caused the rise and fall of empires; it was their own internal rottenness. It may be looking ahead a great distance, but, provided such breeding spots of crime as which is fostered by the city on the Truckee are not checked, yes, obliterated, there is every reason to believe that this country will follow in the steps of her sisters of a bygone day.

Colonel Roosevelt, in a very few words, points Nevada's shame from a standpoint that should appeal to many. The standpoint of dirty dollars. True, as the colonel says, the "wealth brings no advantage." Far from it, it brings shame and disgrace on the fair name of the state. It makes of her the laughing stock of the civilized world and the gathering point of moral degenerates. It is time for the state to commence and figure on future action in relation to this curse. It is time for the electors to commence looking for men that will, two years hence, remedy the evils that now exist and perform a service that should have been performed by the lately defunct "twenty-fifth" session. It became necessary for the nation to legislate against the practices of the Mormons of Utah, let us not make it necessary for the federal powers to legislate against this state on account of the notoriously putrid "divorce colony."

### THIS IS THE NIGHT.

Members of the volunteer fire department, both new and old, are expected to turn out this night to the meeting of that organization and assist in the election of officers that will faithfully perform their duty and make of the department a success, financially and otherwise. The members of the department have taken on new life during the past two days, owing to the fact that about 150 new members have come in and given financial support. Now they need the moral support of the community. The boys of the department are planning to clean up their entire indebtedness and lay away a nest-egg during the present summer months. They will clean up their baseball park and put it in such shape that it will be a credit to Tonopah. Through this medium they expect to make considerable of a sum of money. Some good baseball is promised. However, much depends upon the officers that are elected at that meeting tonight, and it is up to the citizens of the city to take a hand and work for the common good.

### THE SEWER QUESTION.

Considerable comment has been raised through the efforts of the Bonanza to discover just how the business men of Tonopah feel relative to the enforcement of a sewer connection in every business house. Some few are opposed to the action, while the great bulk of the business men are strongly in its favor. Sanitation is the watchword of those who favor every place of business being connected up. With the hot summer ahead, it is pointed out that the cesspools will throw off an odor that is anything but pleasant, and further, that they are breeding places for germ-carrying insects. Hence the general belief that they should be done away with as a safeguard to human health.

Many merchants of this city go even still further than the downtown section and insist that sewer connections should be made also in every residence in Tonopah. These maintain that a sewer is more necessary in the home than in a business house, or at least equally so, and that it should be made a public nuisance to continue the use of cesspools in Tonopah. However, there are sections of the city where it is impossible to secure a sewer connection, or at least where such connection would be useless, owing to the fact that the water company does not touch those points. It is suggested that, should the water company cover the entire city of Tonopah, a great number of residences would be connected with the sewer that now are compelled to resort to the old cesspool system.

### STARTS DISCUSSION.

True to his reputation in the past, the great "T. R." while in Reno Monday, started a new discussion. "Race suicide" is now relegated to the background by the new topic which carries "Teddy's" O. K. The latest is in relation to Catholics holding office in the Young Men's Christian Association. Looks as though such a discussion should be absolutely unnecessary. Provided the organization is what its name implies, by all that is sensible and religious, what is to prevent Catholics from participating in the management of its affairs? If the association is Christian, creeds should be entirely obliterated.

### DEAD IN MINES.

According to the annual report of the chief of the Pennsylvania department of mines, it cost the lives of 1125 men to mine 231,966,070 tons of coal in that state last year. In the hard coal mines the work was more hazardous than in the anthracite production. These figures indicate either recklessness or carelessness of supervision, and certainly an investigation is forthcoming by the federal authorities. State inspection, when mixed with politics, shortly loses its efficiency.

The general staff has made public an expression of pride in the showing made by the army in the recent mobilization movement. This in spite of the criticisms of German military experts. But then German experts always criticize the army maneuvers of other countries. The evolutions of the British troops at Aldershot are a favorite subject for disparaging comment, and even the French army, well trained as it now is, is not spoken of very highly by them. All in all this country gets off fairly well, considering that preparations for warfare are not a principal industry here.

State Senator Holtzlaw of Illinois disgraced himself for nothing when he confessed that he was paid \$2500 for voting for Lorimer for United States senator. State Senator Broderick of Chicago, who was accused of passing him the bribe, has been acquitted. A bank teller testified that Holtzlaw deposited the money with him but evidently he doesn't know \$2500 when he sees it. As for Lorimer, the United States senate has exonerated him and Bailey has declared him the cleanest man in that body. A fine mess, but if Illinois can stand it the nation will have to.

A great deal of money is expended by the advocates of peace in advancing arguments against the folly of waging war, but the amount does not begin to approach that wasted in sending correspondents to scenes of strife where conflict seems possible, and in printing their silly stories, most of which are inspired by the desire that a real scrap might occur in order to give them a chance to do some real descriptive work.

Arthur Burrage Farwell has been telling the people of Chicago that San Francisco's vice conditions are the worst he ever saw. The Chicago papers took pains to report him pretty fully on this point, but omitted to mention that most of his hearers were holding their noses while he spoke so as to exclude the bad smell of the corruption and vice rising from the city by the lake.

Here is a new kind of philanthropy for the practice of which there are abundant opportunities in Wall street. A millionaire of Scranton, Pa., having learned that many investors were swindled through the use of his name as one of the officers of a dishonest stock concern, has bought up and canceled a half million dollars' worth of the company's securities.

Once again the "color" question has cropped up in the effete east. This time in Delaware, where dead and wounded were the result of a race riot for which no excuse is given. Not even the "unpardonable negro sin" is laid at the bottom of the trouble. Nice example that for the far removed southern states, whose negro population is much in excess of the white.

"We have fit and fed for our country," is the slogan of the contending war elements of Mexico and now that we have engaged in the most spectacular almost bloodless war that history has ever heard of, we are ready for peace. Fine work and a bully engagement.
