DRY FARMERS ARE TRYING THEIR LUCK AT UNIONVILLE

WINNEMUCCA, Nev., May 3.—Several dry farmers made locations near Unionville last fall and are planting their first crops this spring. Frank Mottino and G. Gallo are two who took up land. These gentlemen are spending a day or two in town. Mr. Mottino was seen yesterday at the New Reception, and he stated that he located too late last fall to plant any winter wheat, and he is wishing now that he had a little earlier, as the recent rains would bring the wheat out in great shape. He says he has potatoes up two inches high, and so have some of his neighbors. No crops are planted on an extensive scale as the farmers desire to experiment in a small way until they see which crops under existing conditions will give the best results. Wells have been dug on the farms and water is found at a few feet. Some water will be pumped by windmills and some by gasoline. No attempt has yet been made to find artesian water and no definite plans for boring deep wells have been made so far.

RESIGNS OFFICE.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Lawrence Maxwell of Cincinnati has asked President Taft to relieve him of his duties as a member of the postal commission and the president has agreed to do so. This action was announced at the White House late yesterday afternoon. Mr. Maxwell withdrew from the commission because he feared that past services as counsel for express companies would embarrass the administration, the commission and himself.

DEVELOPMENT IS LACKING IN DYNAMITE CASE

MEMPHIS, ALLEGED TO HAVE CONFESSED, MAINTAINS AIR OF JOVIALITY.

LOS ANGELES, May 3.—Although important legal developments were expected soon in the cases of John McNamara, secretary of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, and his brother, James B. McNamara, charged with dynamiting outrages, the week opened quietly, so far as outward appearances were concerned. No further plans of either the prosecution or the defense were definitely announced and both sides seemed waiting for attorneys before taking any formal legal step. No date was fixed positively for the arraignment of the men, nor was it known to which judge of the superior court their cases would be allotted.

VICTIMS OF WRECK ARE RECOVERED

EASTON, Pa., May 3.—All the injured in the Martin's creek wreck of Saturday on the Belyedere-Delaware division of the Pennsylvania railroad who are still at the Easton hospital with the exception of Miss Augusta Light, the New Hartford, N. Y., teacher, and George W. Parsons of Lambertville, N. J., the fireman of the wrecked train, are recovering from the effects of the burns and bruises they received when the train went over the embankment and took fire. Miss Light is in a critical condition and the death of Parsons is momentarily expected.

STATEHOOD NEXT.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—The subcommittee of the house committee on territories is hastening consideration of the constitutions of Arizona and New Mexico so that the full committee may have its report ready for the house at the conclusion of debate on the free list bill. Statehood will be the next matter taken up by the house.

MANY SHOPMEN IN PITTSBURG ARE ON STRIKE

ABOUT 1500 MEN IN THE EMPLOY OF PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD QUIT.

PITTSBURG, May 3.—About 1500 Pennsylvania railroad shopmen struck between this city and Altoona yesterday. Some of the train crews joined the strikers at Piteairn while at the Pittsburg shops, some other employes besides the men involved in the dispute with the railroad company also went out. Among the other pieces in which the men quit are Derry, Youngwood and Conemaugh.

A. E. Ireland, general organizer of the railroad department of the American Federation of Labor, asserts that 8000 men will be affected. The strikers are claiming that other employes of the company to the number of 10,000 will go out in sympathy.

At Piteairn the company has laid off 2500 men, but the 500 men remaining promptly quit.

The grievance of the shopmen is that the company has been discharging and laying off men who have been with the company for years because they belonged to the union. The men went out without any excitement.

It was stated by strike leaders that no attempt will be made to extend the movement to other divisions unless cars are sent to other points to be repaired.


OLD RAILROADER DEAD.
