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PARGE PERCENTAGE NOT IN CHURCHES

COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT TO
PRESBYTERIAN GENERAL
ASSEMBLY.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 23.—The Presbyterian general assembly, having been organized yesterday by the election of Rev. John F. Carson of Brooklyn as moderator, the 800 commissioners were ready to consider reports from special committees.

Among these reports is that of the committee on Christian life and work. The report states that two-thirds of the Presbyteries and synods have given attention to the recommendation of the last assembly that they appoint a committee on inter-church federation.

The report called attention to an investigation made by the secretary of the committee which shows that throughout the country, as a whole, the total number of non-church members is 60.9 per cent. It was also set forth in the report that the number of vacant Presbyterian churches has increased as between 1909 and 1910 from 1886 to 2167.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., May 23.—
The action in behalf of Roy E.
Pierce, son of Henry Clay Pierce,
of St. Louis, the oil magnate, to
annul his marriage to Mrs. Bessie
Chapman Pierce, was tried in the

NEGROES SOURCE OF WORRY TO CANADIANS

OTTAWA, Can., May 23.—The
house of commons began the last
week before the two months' ad-
journment with a morning session
Saturday, and from now until ad-
journment, the house will sit morn-
ing, afternoon and night.

In answer to questions by the
opposition leader, the minister of
finance said that no negotiations
looking to the inclusion of the
Bahamas in the Dominion of Can-
ada had been started. Mr. Field-
ing said though that the subject
would probably be discussed by Sir
Wilfred Laurier and the officials at
the colonial office in London this
month; while Sir Wilfred is at-
tending the imperial conference.

The demand for such action
comes from Montreal and from the
Bahamas, but the western mem-
bers of parliament who already have
a little color line of their own, due
to immigration of United States
negroes into prairie provinces, where
they are taking up homesteads in
large numbers, say that they are
opposed to any wholesale addition
of negroes to Canada by annex-
ation. They are protesting vigorously
against the serious consideration
of the Bahamas.
