## MURDERER TELLS OF THE KILLING OF 47 PERSONS

ST. PETERSBURG, June 9.—Startling revelations were made yesterday by a criminal who murdered an officer of the Russian army and his wife at Sebastopol. The man now says he has, in the course of his career, killed 47 persons, including Dr. Popoff, surgeon of Kazan, for whose death the doctor's assistant and nurse are now suffering imprisonment.

## Latest Get-Rich Scheme Now Being Worked In Pacific States

WASHINGTON, June 9.—A new get-rich-quick scheme, which rivals some of the swindles of recent years for its ingenuity, is being successfully operated in some of the Pacific coast states. Its trail is said to reach as far east as New York. Secret service men are working on it. Prospective victims are told that the United States government is short of money and that to avert a panic the treasury is quietly floating an immense issue of national bank notes. It is represented that a coterie of New York financiers have undertaken to underwrite the issue, which is offered to victims service men say the swindlers usually exhibit a genuine \$5 national bank note as a sample of the issue. Several citizens of Seattle are reported to have paid in sums ranging from \$500 to \$1000 with the expectation of receiving double that sum in genuine national bank notes before next winter. Secret service men have found gathering of evidence difficult as the victim is first initiated into a supposed secret order and sworn to secrecy.

## Death Toll and Damage Is Most Serious for Years

MEXICO CITY, June 9.—Mexico's capital was rocked yesterday by the most serious earthquake experienced in twenty years. The quiet dawn of the ushering in of what was planned to be one of the most festive days in the city's history was rent by a series of terrific shocks which crumbled old walls and took heavy toll of life and property. \*Sixty-three persons are known to be killed and 75 injured. Property damage is placed at \$100,000. When the work of searching the ruins is completed it is possible the list of dead will be lengthened somewhat, as hiding throughout the city there are doubtless many wounded, who with traditional fear of authorities and government hospitals are anxious to evade discovery. More than half of the dead were soldiers. They were caught beneath the falling walls of the artillery barracks in San Cosma, near the Mexican Central station. Another place where the earthquake caused great loss of life was the city power plant of the street car company. Here six were killed and six others wounded. It was 4:36 o'clock when the first shock was felt. According to the observatory, the greatest intensity was reached at the end of the first minute, but the instruments continued to record shocks four minutes more.

LOAD OF SHOT  
TEARS AWAY HIS  
WHOLE HEAD

OAKLAND, Cal., June 9.—While cleaning and priming a repeating shotgun at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon on the back porch of his home at 1116 Brush street, Green Hollinsworth, a mining man, was accidentally killed, the charge from the gun blowing his head completely from his shoulders. Hollinsworth had been ill for some time but was recovering and had arranged for a hunting trip, for which purpose he was getting the weapon into condition. Just how the accident occurred will never be known. When the body was found the ramrod of the gun was still clutched in the hand. The deceased was 58 years of age and had lived here two years, coming from Nevada, where he had been interested in mining. He was quite well-to-do and leaves a wife and stepson, Roy Damon. The body was removed to the morgue. Mrs. Hollinsworth and her son were in the dining room of the home when the accident occurred, and when the former rushed out upon hearing the explosion and saw the remains of the unfortunate man, she collapsed from the shock. She is now under a physician's care and is in a serious condition.

## DEPUTY SHERIFF IS COMING HERE WITH PRISONER

**JOHN MILES TELEGRAPHS THAT  
HE HAS EVADED INDIANS  
AT MANSE.**

Early this morning Sheriff Malley received a telegram from Deputy John Miles at Johnnie, stating that he had reached that point with the prisoner who killed an Indian at Manse the other day. Malley was making preparations to start for Manse when he received the dispatch from his deputy, stating that he anticipated no further trouble from the reds. The Indians in that section belong to the Shoshones and when aroused, are very warlike. The name of the man who killed the Indian at Manse is not known, but it is thought that he will be bound over to the grand jury, though the prisoner claims self-defense. "Life for a life" has been the law of the Shoshones and it was feared that Miles would be unable to bring the prisoner out.

## REBEL LEADERS ARE NOW UNDER ARREST

EL PASO, Texas, June 9.—Four men, alleged to be members of the revolutionary forces in Lower California, and recognizing Ricardo Flores Magon as their head, were arrested by United States secret service officers in El Paso yesterday. Along with them were captured supplies of rifles, ammunition, bandages and hospital equipment, which had been secretly stored in a vacant house, long under watch by government agents. The arrests followed closely upon the announcement of Mexican officials in Juarez that plotters were at work to create a widespread anti-Madero movement out of the disaffection in Lower California. Telegrams had been sent to Madero at Mexico City early in the day, advising him to investigate closely the loyalty of certain federal troops who were about to be sent to the Pacific coast. In consequence 1300 federalists who were enroute at Chihuahua were ordered not to go. A confidential military adviser of Madero, who was left here to look after plotters and who ten days ago caused one arrest at Monterey, Mexico, and another in El Paso, declared he had evidence that certain federal army officers were preparing to join the Lower California party and, if possible, to extend it to other parts of Mexico.
