GETS RESULTS BY DRY FARMING

EXPERIMENT ON LAND CLOSE TO TOWN IS PROVING A SUCCESS.

S. H. Voltaire, who some time ago acquired a tract of land just east of town and is now cultivating a large portion of the land by the so-called dry farming method, is very much pleased with the results so far obtained. He states that all the crops that he planted this season are doing fine without irrigation, depending entirely on what rain falls and the moisture of the ground. Potatoes are up from eight to ten inches high, squash vines are about ready to run and a trial set of alfalfa hay is three inches high and gives every evidence of maturing. Other vegetables that he has planted are looking well and he believes that his project is going to be a grand success.

On account of the land not being fenced, Mr. Voltaire says he has had considerable trouble with rabbits in his garden, but he says this will be overcome when the land is fenced.

In speaking of dry farming in general, Mr. Voltaire states that if the seed recommended by the government is used, he believes that dry farming will be made a success in many sections throughout the state.

PROSPECTING YIELDS RESULTS TO MINERS

IDAHO SPRINGS, Colo., June 29. The lease on the Bride mine, operated by Johnson, Lamb and Woodward, is a striking example of the possibilities of the prospecting which may be done in old mining camps by practical miners who do not scratch the surface, but cut their way through the solid rocks of the depths.

A year ago the Bride mine was an undeveloped claim. In the last nine months it has been opened from the Idaho tunnel at a depth of 500 feet and has yielded \$26,000. The level is but 100 feet long and the stope but 120 feet high. At present the operators are extending the level and preparing to open another similar stope.

A prominent mine expert of the city states the Mining Gazette, declares that the property is now the most promising-looking mine of the district. A year ago it was an unknown quantity, and such are the prospects of 100 such undeveloped veins of the district.

GAMBIER DIVORCE SUIT.

NEW YORK, June 30.—Charles B. Symes testified in the Gambier divorce yesterday that he had followed Mrs. Edith Russell Gambier, the former Atlanta society girl, when she went automobile riding with Harvey C. Slekter, a wealthy member of the Atlantic Fertilizer and Oil company. Sheets of memoranda taken by the witness in this pursuit bore cabalistic letters which Symes had some difficulty in explaining. He could not remember the meaning of "N. G." but said that the letters "N. D." on another sheet probably meant "nothing doing."
