

ACTIVE WORK ON ROAD FROM NORTH

CALDWELL PAPER SAYS THE TRAINS WILL SOON BE RUNNING TO SNAKE RIVER.

The work on the Caldwell-Nyssa section of the Golden Gate Limited, San Francisco, Idaho and Montana, Oregon Short Line extension, line to Snake river, the Caldwell cutoff, Greenleaf special, the Homedale-Tracy controversy or whatever else the public may so designate it, has more than lived up to their expectations in laying steel and having the road in condition to care for trains as far as Snake river within thirty days after the crossing of Main street, says a Caldwell, Idaho, newspaper. The steel gang has already reached the city limits of Greenleaf.

Of the 200 men employed on the project practically the entire force is working on the actual construction work, as no effort to hasten the completion of the line to Snake river is being left undone. A few stray gangs of Greeks may be seen working up and down the track with lining bar, straightening the links from the track and leveling the bed as best they can till permanent ballast can be placed in position preparatory to regular traffic.


Trains at present are able to maintain an average speed of 20 miles per hour for the entire ten miles of track thus far completed, and if present conditions can be used as a basis for future predictions, this fertile country now being opened up will be marketing their products this fall over the Caldwell & Western railroad.

They report that there were about fifty men in the camp when they left. The ground has been staked for several miles both north and south of the original strike on the Murray Scott and Maughan group and claim owners are busily engaged in prospecting and doing the pinch work. A number of promising new finds have been made and everyone in the camp is optimistic over the future, believing there are great things in store, considering the strength of the ledges and the large area over which gold has been already found.
