## NEW WATER SUPPLY FOR LAS VEGAS

LARGE RESERVOIR TO BE CONSTRUCTED ABOVE TOWN; TO BE SANITARY.

It is now stated on good authority that the Las Vegas Land and Water company is preparing to do away with the reservoir from which the city water system is now supplied and place the head gate of the pipe line directly over the original source of supply—the big artesian spring—from which the water bubbles through thousands of tons of virgin sand, pure and undisturbed.

This news will meet with a warm reception by the people of Las Vegas for, while sensible persons do not claim that the water supplied at present is really bad, nevertheless it flows some distance through fields accessible to animals—human and otherwise—and is conserved in a reservoir so constructed that it cannot be flushed, and vegetation grows and stagnates.

It is such a simple matter to extend the pipe line to the spring—only a few hundred yards—and obviate this condition, that the company, it is said, has decided to act at once. The building of a cement retainer around the spring and a few feet in the air will be all that is necessary to furnish good pressure and deliver the water to the city system as pure as it gushes from nature's filter, the surging silvery sands of Vegas' famous spring.—Clark County Review.

## ADMIRAL TOGO TO SEE NAVY YARD WORKINGS

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Admiral Togo, victor of the battle of the sea of Japan, will have no difficulty in viewing everything he cares to see in the New York navy yard.

It is expected he will board the battleship Florida, now nearing completion.

Details of the program of the admiral's entertainment have not been completed, but when he arrives in New York about August 8 he will be received as the guest of the nation.

His followers, however, solved it by making their helpmeets more or less self-supporting.

## NEW COMMISSION IS ASKED FOR BY NEWLANDS

WANTS INTERSTATE TRADE BODY FORMED—FIVE MEN ON THE BOARD.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—An interstate trade commission of five members to control industrial corporations, as the interstate commerce commission controls the railroads, was advocated in a bill introduced in the senate yesterday by Mr. Newlands of Nevada.

Mr. Newlands contended that the Standard Oil and Tobacco decisions and the recent government report of the steel industry demonstrate the need of "an independent, quasi-judicial and administrative tribunal of great character and dignity as far removed from partisan control as are the courts."

The plan is to apply only to industrial corporations engaged in interstate trade whose annual receipts exceed \$5,000,000.

Mr. Newlands' statement was by way of urging the passage of a bill which he introduced providing for this commission. His measure would separate the bureau of corporations from the department of commerce and labor and merge the bureau into a commission of interstate trade, with the commission of corporations a member of the new commission.

It would require the industrial corporations having receipts exceeding \$5,000,000 to make satisfactory statements as to capitalization, finances and operations, such corporations to be known as "United States registered" companies. It proposes to make lack of such registration an "indication" of something wrong.

Mr. Newlands declared that if such legislation had replaced or aided the Sherman anti-trust act more than twenty years ago this country would have advanced as far in the regulation of industrial organizations as it has in railroad regulation. It referred to recent expressions of Mr. Gary of the steel corporation and others as indicating that the great corporation managers recognize that public regulation is now inevitable.

Mr. Newlands said his plan proposes that frequent reports be required from the corporations, information of public interest to be published from time to time; the commission to be "non-partisan not more than three members to be of one party and the term of office to be ten years. Mr. Newlands said that his plan makes no attempt to give too many powers of correction or punishment, nor the power of fixing prices, but its powers

may be enlarged as experience shall indicate.

The measure may at any time cancel the registration of any registered organization, oppressive or unfair methods of competition, acceptance of railroad rebates, refusal to allow access to records, of non-compliance with any judicial decree rendered under the Sherman anti-trust act.

It may in extreme cases, for such offenses, debar the offending corporations from engaging in interstate commerce, and it may require correction of over-capitalization. Its work, according to Senator Newlands is not to be complicated with the administration of anti-trust law.
