**EMERALD BAUBLE WAS VERY EASILY SMUGGLED IN**

**N. Y. OFFICIAL REMEMBERS POSSESSION OF JEWELRY AND TELLS ON HIMSELF.**

SAN FRANCISCO, July 24.—Frederick Stephens, superintendent of public works of the state of New York, who arrived from the Orient yesterday, unconsciously defrauded the United States customs of over \$1800 for several hours. As soon as he realized that he was a smuggler, he acquainted Collector of Port Staton with the fact that he had walked through the squad of inspectors that lined the rail of the steamer Sierra with a \$2000 emerald he had forgotten to declare, jingling again the loose chain in his pocket.

Mr. Stephens secured the gem in Delhi, India, "on approval," desiring to submit it to inspection by a New York jeweler before final purchase. The emerald, which was turned over to Collector Staton, will be shipped to the New York firm under bond furnished by Mr. Stephens. If the experts report favorably, Mr. Stephens will pay the 60 per cent duty on its valuation to the New York customs officials.

**HARLAN WHITTAKER IS FOUND DEAD IN FIELD**

LEXINGTON, Ky., July 24.—Harlan Whittaker, one of the first "mountain men" arrested in 1900 in connection with the assassination of Senator William Goebel, democratic aspirant for the governorship, was found dead yesterday in a corn field in Butler county. Heart disease was the cause of death. Whittaker was released after a long imprisonment.

**RAPID PROGRESS ON THE WABUSKA SMELTING PLANT**

It is very gratifying to those engaged in the many business enterprises in this section to find, as did a representative of a local paper, that work on the great Wabuska smelter is progressing as rapidly as material can be got to the site. The smoke-stack is now practically completed to its required height of 200 feet. The flue and bag-house leading to the stack are walled in, and the arched top nearly completed. Structural steel for two buildings of the smelter proper is on the ground, and steel for the other building is expected any day.

Mr. Burke, of the Hughes Construction company, which concerns is building the smelter, will return from Salt Lake by the end of the coming week with his crew of structural steel workers to begin placing the great frame in place, the cement foundations being already prepared.

The heavy girders of the great ore-weighing scales on the east end of the ore bins are in place, and with more than a hundred men actively at work, smelter hill surely looks like business, and should forever quiet the tongue of the knocker who hollers "stock-selling scheme." Mr. Jules Labarthe, the manager, informed your representative that a 2-cent per ton per miles rate on low-grade ores had been obtained from Southern Pacific company and that ores would be bought from miners all along the line; also that a large tonnage would be handled from Tonopah. The smelter will be blown in some time the coming fall.

The smelter town of Thompson also deserves mention for its water system, from artesian wells bored below the town, new hotel and new store. "Dad" Ferris is in charge and many bungalows for the accommodation of smelter employes are to be had. No doubt of the permanency of that town is maintained.

**PITTSBURG SILVER PEAK COMPANY PAYS \$7500 JUDGMENT**

**JUDGMENT WAS SECURED IN TONOPAH DISTRICT COURT 'ABOUT A YEAR AGO.**

Walter D. Cole and Fred L. Berry, formerly engaged in the law business in Tonopah, now located on the coast, arrived in Reno Saturday to attend to a legal case that necessitated their attention here. Mr. Cole is now engaged in the law business in San Francisco and Oakland and is a member of the firm of Pack & Cole. Mr. Berry is the first assistant district attorney of San Francisco.

Shortly after the arrival of the two attorneys, a settlement was effected in the case of W. R. Cutler vs. the Pittsburg Silver Peak Mining company, wherein the plaintiff was awarded \$7500 for damages. The case was tried in the district court at Tonopah and the judgment about a year ago. Yesterday Platt and Gibbons, representing the defendant company, paid over to Cutler's attorneys the check for the amount stated, together with the interest.

Cutler sustained personal injuries while working for the Pittsburg Silver Peak company at Blair. He was engaged as a carpenter, and while at work on the building with a corrugated iron roof, a high power electric wire dropped on the roof and Cutler received the full force of the electrical shock when

he placed his hands on the iron covering. He lost one finger and severely crippled several others to such an extent that he was unable to pursue his occupation.

The judgment awarded Cutler was the largest on record for the amount of injuries sustained.

**ANOTHER STRIKE AT THE NEW CAMP OF AWAKENING**

Word was received here recently that a new strike has been made on the Truitt & Bray lease at the new camp of Awakening. The samples of rock sent in show a vast amount of free gold and are said to run from \$600 to \$1000 to the ton.

Culver & DeArmond, who are operating a lease immediately adjoining that of Truitt & Bray, have also uncovered some new rock, showing values of from \$250 to \$300 per ton.

Owing to the influx of so many miners and prospectors the supply of water in the camp has begun to run low. It is feared that the well, which was recently sunk, will not be sufficient to supply the demand, and Jack Whits, who has established a hay and feed yard, has begun boring a well on his property.
