INDIANS LOSE SUIT FOR LANDS NEW YORK BOUGHT
ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 1.—No damages are due the Cayuga tribe of Indians, one of the Six Nations, from the sale by the state of New York of land ceded them by the state by the treaty of 1789, on which the state made a profit of \$250,000, according to a decision just announced by the land board.
The matter has been under adjustment for more than a hundred years. With interest, the sum involved now exceeds two million dollars. The state auctioned off the lands in 1796 and the Indians laid claim to part of the proceedings. An act of the legislature of 1848 nullified the claim.

BIG CAVE HAS BEEN OPENED UP IN REVELLE MINE

W. H. Sanders, formerly engineer at the Goldfield hotel, left yesterday for Lucky Boy to take charge of the hoisting and compressor plant of the leasing company which has taken over the famous Alamo property and the operations of which will be conducted under the management of Wellington Morris, a mining engineer well known in Goldfield and formerly identified with the Combination Fraction mine. The new leasing company, of which Chas. Knox is president, has outlined an elaborate plan of development and the property will again take important rank among the producing mines of Nevada.

Mr. Sanders has been on the desert of Southern Nevada for a number of years and it was he who opened the wonderful natural cave in the Southwestern mine at Reveille, sixty miles east of Tonopah, when in charge of that property. This cave is what is known as an apex cave, created by settling of the walls of the great vein of silver-lead ore. Its dimensions are 192 feet long, 72 feet wide and 54 feet high and good ore extends for this entire width. An incline shaft had been sunk which missed the side of the cave by only about 18 inches and the cave was discovered by sinking a vertical shaft, designed to connect with a raise from the incline. The top of the cave was broken into at a depth of 42 feet from the surface. When the miners reported that the last shots had broken into the raise Mr. Sanders, knowing this to be impossible, descended the shaft and found a hole at the bottom about 18 inches across. By lowering a candle he could see neither sides nor bottom until, upon enlarging the hole, he descended on a rope.

Measurements of the incline were taken and the intervening wall was cut through enough to permit of the passage of a man's body. At this time the president of the company, W. W. Morris, visited the property and insisted upon viewing the cave. After some exertion Sanders and Mr. Morris entered the cave through the cut from the incline and while standing near the center of the cave Mr. Morris suddenly leaned back against a large boulder, com-

plained of feeling ill and in a few moments was dead, the cause being ascribed to heart failure.
Later on a shaft was sunk from and a whim installed on the floor of this cave, which was nearly flat, nearly 100 feet below the surface, and double tracks were used on either side of the whim. A large tonnage of good ore was shipped for a time, but the results of development later became unsatisfactory and the property has been idle for several years. The cave is said to be one of the most remarkable known to exist anywhere. The walls, settling or buckling from the apex of the dyke, had formed this hollow in the rock, the presence of which was disclosed by the merest chance. The walls are of lime and the entire mass between them, on and below the floor of the cave, was silver-lead ore of excellent average grade.—Goldfield Tribune.

RETURNS FROM MEXICAN ORE SHOW LARGE NET PROFIT

Returns received this month by the Mexican Mining company for ores shipped to the smelter up to the 24th give a net yield to the company of \$38,100. This amount will be augmented up to the date named, one car included in the above not having been settled in full.
The tonnage represented in these shipments is about 536, and the returns show that the assay value per ton is holding up the average maintained since the regular shipments began, the latest returns giving values from \$70 to \$107 per ton. Ore is being shipped out at the rate of three cars per week, and the probability is that the cash returns from one sold in July will equal, or nearly so, the net yield for June. The shipment of the first class ore from the mine is not only meeting all expenses, but accumulating a surplus in the treasury. In the meantime the second-class ore is being piled up on the dumps and blocked out in the mine, awaiting the completion of the new mill.—Virginia Chronicle.

CASHED CHECKS SHERIFF'S REQUEST BEFORE ARREST

ELKO SHERIFF SECURES GOOD EVIDENCE AGAINST GAMBLERS IN RECENT RAID.
Advices received in this city yesterday from Elko state that the raid conducted on the gambling games in that city last Friday evening by the sheriff and district attorney resulted in the capturing of a roulette wheel and faro layout with all the necessary paraphernalia. The gamblers were caught in the act of placing their bets and at the request of Sheriff Harris cashed in their chips and received money in return, showing that they had been gambling in reality.
Among the persons arrested were four members of the ocean-to-ocean automobile party who had arrived in Elko Friday evening and who departed Saturday morning. All the prisoners were released on \$250 bail, which was furnished by L. L. Bradley, proprietor of the Commercial hotel, where the game was being conducted.
The ocean-to-ocean automobile party is expected to arrive in Reno this afternoon, and it is doubtful if the members who were arrested for gambling will return to Elko to face trial. They gave assumed names at the time of the arrest and it is believed that they will forfeit their bail.
A number of millionaires and prominent business men of Philadelphia, with their families, are in the party, which contains forty people. Thirteen automobiles make up the aggregation.

TO DEDICATE SPOT.
BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Aug. 1.—A red granite boulder, weighing six tons, discovered by the Woodford County Historical society on the farm of Thomas Bratt, near Low Point, will be used to mark the spot where Lincoln and Douglas met in their famous debate at Metamora in 1858.
