**NEVADA HILLS
NEW MILL IS
WORKING FINE**

CAMP JUST ACROSS FROM WONDER HAS HIGH GRADE MILLING ORE.

The Nevada Hills' new mill at Fairview is now running at full capacity, the last five of the battery of twenty stamps having commenced dropping on the 19th of September. Ten of the stamps were started on the 10th, five more on the 15th, and the remainder on the 19th.

The water storage tanks are now practically filled, and an ample supply for milling purposes is assured. The mill is crushing 125 tons a day that will average \$25, and the tonnage will be increased as the work proceeds. All the machinery started without a hitch, and the plant is doing all that was expected of it.

Sinking of the new shaft, says the Wonder News, is progressing rapidly and it is now down nearly 500 feet. A station has been cut at the 450-foot level and a cross-cut will be run to intersect the Eagle and Wingfield ore bodies.

The company is making new maps and glass models of all the workings.

**EXPERIMENTAL TEST
OF RAILROAD TIES**

Ten thousand railroad ties that have been "pickled" in Great Salt Lake, Utah, for the last three years have just been removed from that body of highly mineralized water and are now being transported to Hazen, Nev., there to be given a trial on the new Hazen cutoff of the Southern Pacific company. The "pickling" of railroad ties in the Great Salt Lake is by no means a new experiment on the part of the railroad company.

There are ties in the old Promontory line of the Central Pacific railway which were placed there 40 years ago and have not decayed, proving the preservative qualities of the salt formation in which they "pickled" for years before being laid on the roadbed. Piling is also being preserved in this lake as excellent results have been obtained by the piling in the great trestle across the lake, which, since the day it was first placed in the first part of the construction of the Lucin cutoff, has shown no deterioration.

The ties that have just been removed from the Great Salt Lake will be subjected to a hard test in the alkali soils of Nevada. The "pickling" process has caused them to become heavily impregnated with salt and they act as a "ground" to the electric current in the block signal service. This fact makes them unfit for use on the main line of the company over which the block signals play a most important part.

The preserving of ties and piling in Great Salt Lake may become an important industry, if the experiments now being worked out prove as successful as former tests.
