**GRAND JURY
EXAMINES DEAN**

**INQUISITORIAL BODY INVESTI-
GATES THE DEMISE OF
JESSE JACKSON.**

John Dean, who is being detained
at the city hall in Reno, following
the verdict of the coroner's jury
that investigated the demise of Jesse
Jackson at Reno, was taken before
the Washoe county grand jury on
Wednesday afternoon, and the in-
quisitorial board spent several hours
investigating the case. The wit-
nesses. It is understood, who testi-
fied at the inquest, were also present
and gave their versions of the
story.

It was learned yesterday that
at the post-mortem examination over
the remains of Jackson, resulted in
the recovery of a .22 caliber bul-
let from the skull of the dead man.
The bullet was extracted by Dr.
Sammels and was imbedded partly
in the skull.

Following this announcement, it
was discovered that Jackson, a
number of years ago, had attempted
suicide by firing the bullet into
his brain. He was examined after-
wards and physicians made the
statement that the leaden missile
had not penetrated the skull, but
had glanced off and after inflicting a
lengthy incision, had not entered the
bone.

Jackson had frequently complain-
ed of headaches after the suicidal
attempt but the cause was never
attributed to the pressure of the
bullet.

Funeral services in private were
held over the remains of Jackson
Thursday afternoon.
The grand jury returned no re-
port yesterday regarding Dean, and
it is understood that they will not
report to the court until Saturday
afternoon. In the meantime Dean
will remain in custody in the city
prison.
