W. A. MOORE HAS DOUBLE AFFLICTION

W. A. Moore of Newark valley was summoned to Eureka again this week on a second sad mission—both times within a month. First, his wife, who gave up her life in childbirth, was called; and now the babe that survived her, their infant daughter, has followed, and Mr. Moore was summoned here to arrange for the burial.

The death of the infant occurred at the home of Mrs. Rose Davis in Eureka on Wednesday last, about noon. The direct cause is not known. Mrs. Davis, who has been taking care of the child, fed and put it to sleep, and afterward engaged in doing her household duties. Later she sent her little girl in to see if the baby was all right, and upon being informed that the baby looked unusually pale, immediately went in and took the child up—it gave one gasp and was gone. Dr. G. M. Roberts was immediately called and diagnosed the cause of the infant's death as heart failure.

Mr. Moore, accompanied by his three sons and daughter, and Mrs. Gent Martelletti, reached Eureka Thursday afternoon, and the bur of his infant daughter took place Friday afternoon from the home of Mrs. Rose Davis on Cedar Hill. The interment was in the city cemetery beside the mother. The child was aged 33 days.

Mr. Moore and his deceased wife's sister, Mrs. James Butler of San Jose, Cal., had arranged for his youngest son, Thomas; daughter, Elma, and infant daughter, Annie, to leave Eureka the first of the year for the home of Mrs. Butler in San Jose, where they were to make their home for the present. A trained nurse had been sent by Mrs. Butler, to arrive in Eureka this week. She was intercepted at the Raine ranch in Pine valley yesterday, and notified to return to Palisade and await the arrival there of Mr. Moore and his two children, who now expect to leave here next Monday for San Jose.—Eureka Sentinel.

HEALTH RETURNS AFTER OPERATION

GOLDFIELD MAN IS CONVALESCENT AFTER LONG PERIOD OF SUFFERING.

Friends of E. W. Boyd, formerly manager of the Nevada-California Power company, have received a letter from Mrs. Boyd, telling of the great improvement in Mr. Boyd's health and the apparent assurance of his complete and early recovery as the result of an operation by which a tumor was removed from the brain. An earlier operation at Los Angeles did not prove successful, although the patient seemed to improve. He was taken to his old home at Houston, Texas, and upon suffering a relapse it was decided to operate at once. This operation is said to have been entirely successful, and Mr. Boyd has been pronounced on the road to complete recovery.

The letter states that Mr. Boyd has suffered intensely, and that it was decided the changeable, wet weather of Los Angeles was not beneficial. He was taken to a sanitarium at Houston upon arrival there, and the operation, regarded as a delicate one, was successful. The pain has been relieved. He remained in the hospital only 14 days, and while, at last reports, he was still suffering, he was in a perfectly normal condition mentally and rapidly regaining strength, with no possibility of any injurious effects from either illness or operation.—Goldfield Tribune.

OHIO DEMOCRATS ADHERE TO LEADERSHIP OF BRYAN

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 4.—The Progressive Democratic League of Ohio came into being at a conference of democrats from nearly every county in the state. Although many of the conferees entered into the conference with the avowed intention of declaring against the presidential candidacy of Governor Harmon, his name was mentioned only casually, and the organization contented itself with the adoption of resolutions urging the members to work against the selection of delegates to state and national conventions who have not proven themselves tried and true democrats.

The name of W. J. Bryan, heralded as the "ablest to represent the progressive ideals in any party," was received with applause, and all speakers made adherence to him the final test of progressive democracy. Former Congressman J. J. Lentz was made chairman of the conference, and later was elected president of the newly formed league.
