WOODMEN OF THE WORLD ELECT THEIR OFFICERS

SUGAR FACTORY WILL NEED 100,000 TONS OF BEETS

RENO, Jan. 25.—With the dual motive of advancing their own enterprise and of helping the farmers in this locality, Fred Hinze, the manager of the Nevada Sugar Co., and Prof. Charles S. Knight, chief agriculturist of the corporation, have come from Fallon and are at the Riverside.

The Nevada Sugar company has, at the expense of hundreds of thousands of dollars, established a large and up-to-date sugar factory at the sink of the Carson.

This season a short run was made as an experiment and the mill was found to work perfectly in every detail. A quantity of the sugar that was produced was put up in small bags and given away to the visitors. It was found by all who tested it to be of a superior grade.

Now that the experimental run has been made and the beets grown for the company have proven to run much higher in saccharine than was expected, the Nevada Sugar company hopes and expects to operate next season at full capacity, which means that it wants to purchase from 75,000 to 100,000 tons of sugar beets, perhaps more.

IN FAVOR OF TAFT.

COALGATE, Okla., Jan. 25.—The republican convention of the Fourth congressional Oklahoma district went on record by a vote of 188 to 32 favoring the re-nomination of President Taft.

WHITE SLAVER FOUND GUILTY IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—

Lewie Santianni has been convicted in the United States district court on a charge of violating the interstate commerce white slave traffic act and next Tuesday was appointed as the day for his sentence, by Judge DeHaven, Santianni being accused of bringing Katie Pecitte, a young girl, to California from Nevada for immoral purposes.

Santianni and his young consort were for a time in Sacramento and later went to Stockton, where they were arrested in company with another couple. The other girl in the case, Mary Knez, was committed to an institution for delinquent girls at Stockton.

The girl testified that she met Santianni at a dance in Tonopah, Nev., that she invited him to visit her at her home on a ranch near that place and later at his request, she followed him to Truckee, and from there to Sacramento. She testified as to her life in the tenderloin in Sacramento, declaring that she had always divided her earnings with Santianni.

EVERY PERSON TO BE SEARCHED FOR FIREARMS

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 25.—

When the hearing in the J. Sneed habeas corpus proceedings is resumed, every person who comes into the court room will be searched for firearms. The judge made this announcement when court adjourned and it is believed to have been prompted by rumors of impending trouble. The evidence and arguments will be heard today.

A. G. Boyce, Jr., eloped with Sneed's wife, going to Winnipeg. Sneed went there and brought his wife back. A few days later he shot and killed A. G. Boyce. He now seeks to be released on bond.

Sneed's attorneys tried to prove the dead man aided his son in the escape. Young Boyce is said to be in Canada.

Semi-Annual Apportionment of the State School Money

Following is a statement of the first semi-annual apportionment of state school moneys for 1912, on the basis of \$116,2704 for each teacher, and \$2,41289 for each child; 70 per cent is apportioned to teachers, and 30 per cent to school census children. The apportionment to teachers is made on the basis of one teacher for thirty census children or fraction thereof in the various districts of the state. Each teacher on this basis and each census child gets the same amount in every district in the state:

CARNEGIE WAS PAID \$22.70 FOR GIVING EVIDENCE

IRON MASTER PRESENTS PROOF AND RECEIVES PAY FOR TESTIMONY.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Andrew Carnegie has been paid for the testimony he gave the steel trust investigation committee.

When on the stand Carnegie said he would not take the money, but later a duly attested voucher with the iron master's signature attached was received from New York. Payment was refused because a notarial seal was omitted.

"I know these formalities are trying," wrote Jerry South, disbursing officer of the house, in returning the voucher to Carnegie, "but a certain amount of red tape must be unwound and a government official is at the spool end."

The voucher in proper form was received yesterday and a check for \$22.70 was remitted to Carnegie by return mail.
