**COULON TO FIND STUMBLING BLOCK IN CHICK HAYES**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 8.—Little Johnny Coulon will find a new stumbling block in the way of his triumphal march to the bantamweight championship when he is asked to defend the title against Chick Hayes of Indianapolis, who has just gained the better of a ten-round argument with Monte Attell by a shade. The Hoosier boy adds another complication to the Coulon-Attell wrangle over "who's who" in the bantamweight class, for despite his youth and small amount of experience, Hayes gave the bantam ring veteran the surprise of his life in their recent Indianapolis fight, and gained the newspaper decision over Monte Attell.

Attell still claims that the bantamweight title belongs to him, and asserts that Coulon is not rightfully its possessor, either in reputation or record. But Hayes seems to be the one way of solving the question. If Coulon demonstrated in his short work of Harry Forbes that he is of championship caliber, Hayes certainly demonstrated that he is willing to battle his way to the title by taking on Coulon's rival under conditions which Attell says Coulon himself would not accept.

Monte says Coulon can have a meeting with him at any time if the conditions stipulate 116 pounds six hours before the bout, but adds that Coulon will have none of it unless the weight clause reads 116 pounds ringside. Hayes took Attell at the early weighing condition, and although the Hoosier did not win decisively he had the better of the argument, according to the experts who saw the mill.

Hayes is under the management of Ray Bronson, claimant of the welterweight championship, who says that the little fellow will be put on through until he has wrested the bantam laurels from all comers, Coulon included. He believes Hayes to be the fastest boxer in the business today. Attell admitted after the bout that he met the greatest surprise of his nine years' career, and never faced a boy who worked faster from going to going than did the Indiana chicken.

Attell and Hayes are matched to meet again at Indianapolis, when the youngster will try to demonstrate more completely his superiority. Attell is older in years and experience and seems to have a little stronger punch than Hayes, but the lightning speed of the boy dazzled Monte so that he was unable to land effectively at any time. Neither was he able to block Hayes' onslaught and took more punishment than he has before in many days.

If Hayes can beat Attell decisively enough so that there is not an element of draw in the result of their meeting, he will be headed for Coulon, as soon as a match can be arranged. It is certain that few of the other bantams in the country than Coulon will have good

luck with the chicken, after he has made Monte Attell be good. Hayes is but 19 years old, and has been fighting but two years.

**COLLECTS LICENSE ON UTAH AND IDAHO SHEEP**

Sheriff Harris has returned from the eastern part of the county, bronzed and bearded, from hundreds of miles of travel over the deserts in the southern and eastern parts of Elko county. He had been chasing bands of sheep owned by parties living in Idaho and Utah, that had been brought in from these two states for winter pasturage on the white sage deserts in Elko county, says the Elko Free Press.

Up to the present writing he has accounted and secured a license of 5 cents on each head of 94,000 sheep, and says it is a difficult task to run down a band of sheep in some parts of the desert, where the canyons are so large and deep, but he says but two small bands have gotten away. The herders take a pride in evading this license tax and will take advantage of all sorts of unfair methods to deceive the sheriff, but Harris has gotten "wised up" to them and they are coming through fine.

This desert, covering over a million acres, is grown up with small white sage that will not fattening is nourishing and keeps the sheep alive. Along in the latter part of November the sheep begin drifting down from Idaho and Utah and with the first snowfall the bands are crowded out onto the desert. There is no water anywhere, but the sheep eat the snow and keep alive. The white sage is a small bunchy grass or bush that seemingly grows without the aid of moisture, and eaten down one year, springs up and a new crop is ready the following winter. About the first of March the band starts on their homeward journey, and by this method a man can buy and range a band of sheep without owning an acre of ground. Many fortunes have been made by men in the sheep business, without investing one cent in real estate.

**THE APPLE WOULD TEMPT MR. ADAM**

A tree bearing coreless and seedless apples has been accidentally discovered in Nevada, says a dispatch to the New York Herald. "The tree from which the seedless apples grew is seven years old, but has been nibbled back each year by cattle. This year it bore 75 perfect specimens, all seedless and coreless. A peculiarity is that the withered stems and pistils may still be seen."

Whether the freak apple, like the seedless orange, may be induced to further propagation has been considerably brought to the attention of Luther Burbank. A coreless apple would be a new temptation to mankind.—Philadelphia Record.

**HIGH GRADE ORE IN MINERAL HILL**

At the Mineral Hill Consolidated company's property, at East Manhattan, the shoot of high-grade ore, in the old Burr-Thomas lease, owned by the company, has been followed in the west drift and shipping ore assaying as high as \$1400 a ton has been extracted. From this drift a winze is now being sunk on the ore shoot and a high average ore is being mined and sacked ready for shipment. The main development tunnel shows that the vein is now in porphyry beneath the lime capping of the mountain.

**BIG STRIKE IS REPORTED.**

A big strike was made at Jarbidge yesterday on the Alpha claim, owned by Judge L. O. Ray. Last fall ore was struck on this claim at a depth of a few feet and a cut was run for several hundred feet along the vein, but it was not developed. Sinking was recently begun and the late report came over the wire that the bottom of the shaft was in five feet of ore, showing free gold. No assays had been made when the report was sent in.—Independent.

**PHENOMENALLY RICH ORE AT ROUND MOUNTAIN**

Phenomenally rich samples, carrying 18,000 ounces in silver and \$700 in gold to the ton were received in this city this week by J. C. Canrohat, general manager of the Jefferson Gold & Silver Mining company, from Superintendent Fred Smith of the property, near Round Mountain, in Nye county, Nevada, says the Salt Lake Herald.

**FORGOT THE LICENSE.**

A. R. Smith, a liquor dispenser who started business in Fairview last fall, waived the formality of taking out a license to vend liquor after being notified repeatedly by the sheriff's office. He is serving out a 60-days' sentence in the county jail for the omission. Sheriff Coniff arrested Smith last Wednesday and Judge Jones did the rest on the following day.—Churchill Standard.
