

THE MANHATTAN AMALGAMATED MINING COMPANY

The Manhattan Amalgamated Mining company was formed for the purpose of taking over the Granny holdings and the holdings of the Liberty and Justice Gold Mining company. Such a merger has been effected and the Manhattan Amalgamated Mining company is now the owner of all the mining properties held by the above two companies. This property consists of the Granny claim, the Liberty, or what is called the Forman Fraction, and all that part of Union No. 5, lying east of the west side line of the Granny.

On the Fraction on what was formerly known as the Vacanovich lease, is a shaft 150 feet deep and equipped with all necessary machinery, including an electric hoist. This lease is now being operated by Tom Kendall, who is also operating an adjoining lease on the Manhattan Consolidated. From this shaft and above the 150-foot level has been taken out and milled about \$25,000 and it now has a fine showing and also has about one hundred tons on the dump that will run better than \$30 per ton.

On the old Granny claim about 150 feet from the west end of the Manhattan Consolidated's Silver Pick claim is a shaft 300 feet deep and equipped with hoist and all the necessary machinery, including a pump. It is the intention of the company to prospect and work on its own account the remainder of its ground, and this shaft will be sunk one or two hundred feet deeper. Crosscuts will be run to cut known ledges, as well as to prospect the intervening ground.

The Manhattan Amalgamated joins the Manhattan Consolidated on the west, the Earl on the north, the Litigation Hill Merger and Manhattan Union Extension on the east and Manhattan Red Top Gold Mining company on the south, and is in the heart of what is conceded by all to be the most attractive part of the Manhattan mining district. The Associated mill is on this and Manhattan Consolidated properties adjoining.

The company is capitalized for one million and a half shares of the par value of one dollar each, \$25,000 of which are in the treasury.

HOME RULE BILL IS PLEASING TO MANY PEOPLE

IRISH PAPERS EXPRESS SATISFACTION WITH MEASURE INTRODUCED.

DUBLIN, Ireland, April 12.—The nationalist papers of Ireland on the whole consider the government's home rule bill as satisfactory, although some of them profess to regard it as not being final.

The Freeman's Journal described the bill as the greatest, boldest and the most generous of the three home rule bills, and says: "We should not be surprised to find it received with hearty welcome by the Irish party."

The Irish Times, Unionist, says: "The measure will prove so utterly unworkable as to offer no middle course between complete separation from Great Britain and a return to the status of the union."

The Irish Independent remarks: "It would probably be correct in describing the bill to say that it gives us three-quarters of what we expected and probably not so large a share of what we demanded. The measure cannot be regarded as final."

The Cork Free Press says: "The government scheme is not a solution of the Irish problem."

RIO GRANDE AIDS WESTERN PACIFIC

TWO AND ONE-HALF MILLIONS TO BE DEVOTED TO IMPROVEMENTS.

Shareholders of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, the holding company of the Western Pacific, will be called upon April 22d to vote upon the authorization of \$25,000,000 adjustment mortgage bonds.

\$10,000,000 immediately, out of which it is proposed to have the Denver & Rio Grande acquire \$1,000,000 obligations of the Western Pacific and to pledge the same under the adjustment mortgage, says the San Francisco Chronicle.

A portion of the proceeds of these obligations is to be used by the Western Pacific toward payment of interest on its first mortgage bonds, maturing not only these bonds, but also the revenues of the Denver & Rio Grande in view of its contract relations with the Western Pacific and its guarantee of interest on the Western's first mortgage bonds.

The \$10,000,000, it is also proposed, will be devoted in part to important improvements on the Western Pacific, including the completion of the Sacramento, about a 200-mile line for the prompt maintenance of equipment and the replacement of a new ferry steamer to replace the Teleshot, which is now under way of wholly inadequate for the Western's increasing business here.

Another improvement to be made is the completion of the low-grade line known as Arnold's loop, 14 1/2 miles west of Salt Lake City.

Comings and Goings of Local People and Others.


