PIONEER FIREMEN TAKE RELICS TO CARSON CITY

F. W. Plunkett, the youngest of the exempt firemen of Virginia City, was a visitor to this city yesterday morning, bringing to Henry Rosenbrock, also one of the seven remaining exempt firemen, the hand carved wooden eagle, which was the emblem of the Eagle Engine company of the Comstock in 1869. He bought also a silver trumpet which was won by the Young America Engine company in a hose race on July 4, 1869. The names of the men who composed the team are engraved upon the trumpet, among them being the name of Clerk of the Supreme Court Joe Josephs. The banner of the exempt company is also among the relics brought to this city and turned over to Mr. Rosenbrock. Only seven of the exempt firemen remain, three of whom are residents of this city. They are Henry Rosenbrock, General Woodburn, Joe Josephs, Sam Jones, Lew Wardle, Will Shields and F. W. Plunkett.—Carson News.

SOLDIER BOYS' FEET TREATED

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Experiments to abolish corns from the feet of Uncle Sam's soldier boys are being made by direction of Secretary of War Stimson.

A new type of shoes for the military service is being developed, in the interests of increased efficiency and comfort of the soldiers.

An "army shoe board" has been ordered to convene at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, where preliminary tests with various types of shoes have been held. An order has been placed with the shoe factory to make 100 pairs of the new experimental type for the test demonstrations. Major William J. Glasgow has been assigned to superintend the manufacture.

Slight alterations to the broad shape of the toes of the present army shoes are recommended in the experimental shoes. Less oil in the leather is another innovation to be tried.

The shoes will be made in three styles, for garrison and marching service, and tried out upon members of the Seventh Infantry. A march of 112 miles will be the final supreme test of the new shoes.

INCOME TAX IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, April 19.—The stormclouds are gathering in the senate for the reception to be given the income tax bill passed by the house and now in the hands of the senate finance committee.

Senators declare that it falls far short of the bill that will be passed when the income tax amendment to the constitution is adopted. The amendment has received the endorsement of thirty states and, it is confidently believed, that the six states needed for its complete ratification will be in line within a year.

Evidence of the feeling toward the measure by a number of senators was forcefully stated today by a prominent member of the senate, who said:

"This bill has all the legal objections that a truly income tax bill would have at this time. Of course, an attempt will be made to justify the bill in a legal sense by the supreme court decision on the corporation tax."

"That decision sustained the validity of the tax on the proposition that the capacity to do business as corporations was such an advantage to those who enjoyed it that they could be charged with a special tax."

"Now this bill covers the doing of business of any kind by an individual or otherwise, a vested right. In practical effect it is but a direct tax on individuals."
