### YERINGTON COPPER IMPROVING DAILY.

The Yerington copper mine, east of Yerington about three miles, is showing to be one of the good ones of the district. On the east side of the hill Superintendent Marsal has made a most important development and is now producing 15 per cent copper from it. As this is some 3,000 feet east of the deep shaft, it only goes to prove the wonderful possibilities of the property producing ore of a very high erty. The big incline workings, grade, and shipments are the regular order. As soon as the water line is in operation stoping will begin on the 400-foot level, at which time the shipments will increase as rapidly as the level can be opened to a greater length. That Superintendent Marsal is making a big mine is as sure as anything can possibly be in mining. With ore on the east side what will he develop in a distance of 3,000 feet? We believe it is as big a mine as any in the district. It is just such perseverance as is displayed by such companies and men that make districts—actual development and no wildcatting. All honor to such legitimate enterprises as the Yerington Copper.—Times.

### STRIKE AT TERRILL.

A strike of considerable importance and much significance was made in the Green-Vruble lease on the Last Hope ground in Terrill last week. At a depth of 100 feet, the deepest workings in the camp, the ledge on this ground is widening out and values of eight and one-half ounces in gold, \$71 in silver, and a good percentage of lead have been encountered. The lessers expect to hit the big contact in another 50 feet of depth. The Davis ground, which end-lines this property, has produced some \$150 ore, which was shipped by Tom Kearns. Watch out for the old camp of Terrill this summer.
