# PROGRESS MADE IN CAMP OF MANHATTAN

(Special to Bonanza.)

MANHATTAN, Nev., May 25.—In the three years and three months just past, "Dry Wash" Wilson has drifted out and sluiced the gravel from a half mile of Manhattan's gold-impregnated gulch. Today he is in the act of moving and erecting three large and most complete plants at as many points, from a mile and a half to three miles further down and from a leaser of a half-mile of placer ground, he is now the owner of a mile and a half of the gulch, which he will proceed to work with greater zeal than has characterized his past extensive operations.

He has drifted out both the dry and wet channels of the Wolfstone Extension for a length of 500 feet, the Mustang Extension for 750 feet and the September claim for 1000 feet. Wilson's career as a placer miner at Round Mountain and Manhattan has been as consistent as his efforts have been successful. In his original dry washing operations at the former place, which gave him his far-famed sobriquet, he cleaned up in 70 days in the neighborhood of \$40,000. It was in February, 1909, that he started the erection of his first plant on the Wolfstone Extension and he was the first to produce and clean-up placer gold in the Manhattan gulch. His lease soon was on a paying basis. In quartz mining then there was "nothing doing," but Wilson's success caused a new start and the latter industry then took its second wind. To this circumstance the present amazing activity of Manhattan dates back.

Subsequently he sold his Wolfstone Extension lease to Tom Murphy and associates, of Goldfield, for \$15,000. He then sold some other ground and has bought much more.

During the first days of placer mining here there were some failures. These were due to inexperience.

## "DEAD MAN" FIGURES IN CONFIDENCE GAME

LOS ANGELES, May 27.—Two men operating a confidence game in which an alleged "corpse" figured, obtained \$100 from sympathetic passengers from San Diego yesterday. B. F. Murphy of San Diego, was told by a chance acquaintance on the train that he was taking the corpse of his wife to Boise City from Santa Ana. Another stranger appeared, claiming to be an express agent, demanded \$60 for the transfer of the corpse to another railroad line in Los Angeles. Murphy loaned the supposedly bereaved husband \$40. The two men then disappeared. Another man is reported to have lost \$60 yesterday in the same manner.

## LIVES REPORTED LOST IN WRECK OF TRAIN

FORT WILLIAMS, Ont., May 27.—The first section of train No. 1 Canadian Pacific railroad, west bound, went into the ditch between Mississauga and White River, Ontario, shortly before midnight. It is reported that several lives were lost. The engine, baggage cars, two colonist cars and two day coaches left the track, tearing down telegraph lines and disconnecting all the wires.

ence and necessity of getting the money at the earliest moment. The latter cause showed itself in stopping, directly around the shafts and drifts where pay was first found, without waiting to drift to upper or back lines, with consequent cave-ins, losses and failures. Wilson never made such a mistake. He opened all of his ground properly and never practiced economy in the amount of room given his miners in which to work. He always timbers well, takes out an ample height of dirt and sluices all that contains gold. His plants are extensive and complete. Of these he uses two general styles. In the wet channel he uses the Alaska tram and in the dry an elevator.

"What grade of gravel do you consider will pay?" was a question put to Mr. Wilson by the writer. "In the dry channel from \$3 to \$5 a yard," he said. "In the wet from \$4.50 to \$6."

"Do you think the pay is as good down the gulch to where you are moving as it was where you are leaving?" "I think it is distributed about the same all along the gulch. As you go down the gulch the channels are fed by side gulches and ravines from quartz mines on both sides. We find gold from various mines that can be detected at a glance. That from the Union No. 9 and Big Four are about the same. It is very bright and showy. The gulch is fed also from Giffen's gulch from the Original Manhattan at Central, from Independence gulch and various others. We also have gold containing rose quartz, the source of which never has been located. The largest nugget I ever found here contained rose quartz. It contained \$75 in gold. This run of gold is worn very smooth showing that it has traveled a long distance. It is found all along the gulch."

## ACCIDENT AT MINERAL HILL

Two employes of the Mineral Hill Mining company at Mineral Hill, about fifty miles from Eureka, were killed Monday after a mad flight in a runaway ore car down a 2,000-foot incline. The car crashed through the mill and also went through the roof of the tank building adjoining, ending its dash in twelve feet of water. One of the victims was named Quillie and leaves a family in Carlin. The other is an Italian whose name is not known.
