PLAN TELEPHONE LINE TO FOLLOW NEW AUTO ROAD

One of the proposed plans in connection with the establishment of the transcontinental auto route from Salt Lake through Ely and Tonopah to Los Angeles is to install a telephone system along the route. This may be put in by the Bell telephone interests or by residents along the route who would welcome it and find it of great service to them in many ways. One objection to the route that is advanced by tourists is that it gets so far away from the railroad and far from any means of communication with the outside world. It is to overcome this objection that the building of the telephone line is suggested.

A novel feature of the proposed system would be the providing of places where tourists carrying portable telephone outfit could cut in on the line without having to go very far from wherever they might be. On one pole in every mile a loop would extend down the pole to permit cutting in on the line so that in case or trouble a tourist provided with a telephone set would have to go less than a mile to summon help. The line would extend to many ranches and doubtless arrangements could be made to have each rancher make regular inspection of a certain portion of the line to see that it is kept in repair.

A number of portable telephone instruments would be kept at both ends of the line and a tourist desiring to avail himself of the use of the line would be supplied with an instrument for which he would make a cash deposit. At the other end of the line the most of his deposit would be refunded to him on the surrender of the instrument. During some parts of the year the income from this source might amount to considerable and would go toward paying for the up-keep of the line.

If the state highway commission of Utah formally adopts one of the roads to Deep Creek as a state road, signs will be put up immediately so no tourist can go astray and the commissioners of White Pine county will also see that signs are put up along the road in this county.—Ely Expositor.

NEW STRIKE IN SWASTIKA DISTRICT BETWEEN BELMONT AND TYBO MAY CAUSE RUSH

Manhattan Correspondent Visits Scene Sunday and Is Optimistic Over Conditions as Found.

(Special to The Bonanza.) MANHATTAN, Nev., June 10.—The new silver-gold strike in the Swastika mining district was visited Sunday by your correspondent. For the benefit of hosts of readers who may contemplate joining in the stampede that seems bound to follow the news of the strike, a careful observation of all of the main features of the district was made, as well as an inspection of the strike itself.

The old Belmont-Tybo road passes directly through what, according to the opinion of the writer, will be the very heart of the mineral producing district. It is nearly midway between Belmont and Tybo, being some sixteen miles from the former and nineteen miles from the latter place. It is about four miles east of the Tybo summit on that road, which brings it close to the base of the Monitor range on the east or Stone Cabin valley side.

The statement that the road will pass through the heart of the camp is made by reason of the fact that on both sides of McCann canyon the presence of rich silver-gold ores has been ascertained during the past few months, by Jim Hughes, Aaron Castle and Harry Stimler, these several finds constituting in reality the Swastika discovery.

For about a mile north and south of the canyon and road, surface indications of a very rich character are found; that on the south being the main strike which has caused the excitement and where George Wingfield thought enough of the showing to take a bond and pay wages to a force of men to further develop it during the life of his option.

The first discoveries, however, were on the north side and are quite extensive. A great deal of float carrying values as high as \$100 a ton was found around the base of a couple of peaks. Later the prospectors found ledges running through both peaks and carrying exceedingly high silver values in streaks, stringers and narrow ledges. Very little work was done, which was by reason of the large amount of snow. The altitude is almost 8,000 feet.

The south or main discovery is about three-fourths of a mile from the road. It is reached by a side gulch with a very easy grade so that autos can go within 300 feet of the shaft. It is on the western slope of a hill and in the midst of a porphyry formation that extends throughout the district where mineral indications are found.

At that point various stringers, seams and small veins come to the surface and in most of them horn-silver is plain to the eye. These stringers are from one to a dozen feet apart and are found all over and through a dike of about seventy feet in width. That values are there no question remains. The point for conjecture now is whether the stringers converge into a big high grade ore body or retain their individuality as they go into the earth. However that may be the material between the stringers, so far as actually ascertained by sinking a couple of shafts is all a not very low grade milling ore.

A shaft is being sunk on the upper one of the known veins and in it that is the condition that has been found to exist. In its depth of about sixteen feet the porphyritic quartz carries values. A great deal of it pans some gold and nearly all of it horn-silver. The seams show the horn-silver and some bromide is traceable through the rock when broken. The gold is coarse and heavy.

The dike crops at various places

north and south of the shaft and at various places in the vicinity north and south of the shaft and though not on a direct line north-ward and south-ward are similar croppings. Mineralized float occurs wherever the croppings are to be seen.

A very persistent parallel ledge a few hundred feet west is that of Jack May. He can walk on his cropping for almost 4,500 feet and has staked it for the three claim lengths included in that distance. It likewise shows considerable horn-silver and carries gold values. It is a very distinctive white quartz, being harder and not identical with the ore in the Wingfield shaft.

TONOPAH SHOWS STEADY GROWTH IN POPULATION

SON AND HEIR ARRIVES TO GLADDEN HOME OF MR. AND MRS. LOUIS TRESSCOTT.

Tonopah is daily gaining in population and at the present rate it will not be long before the census enumerator will be able to place this city as the largest town in the state. Another increase was noted Sunday with the arrival of a baby boy at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Tresscott. The son and heir, the first to arrive at the Tresscott home, was reported this morning as progressing favorably as was the mother.

Mr. Tresscott is employed at one of the local mines. Mrs. Tresscott, before her marriage several years ago, was Miss Electa Thomas, sister of W. H. Thomas, manager of the Tonopah-Goldfield meat market.

It is understood that Mrs. Taft, Mrs. Roosevelt and Mrs. James Garfield have promised to help by presenting dresses which they have worn on state occasions in Washington.
