**A Regrettable Incident**

It was with extreme regret that the Bonanza published an answer Wednesday evening to the charges as appeared in the Goldfield Tribune Tuesday evening of the alleged treatment afforded the representative of the southern city while visiting in this city. The charges that the people of Tonopah refused the Goldfield representative permission to hang up posters advertising the celebration in the neighboring city were untruthful and unfounded. The representative in question experienced no trouble in covering the dead walls of this city with his advertisements. However, he paid no heed to signs prohibiting the posting of bills on certain fences and in a few instances of this kind he was requested to remove his advertisement.

The people of Tonopah are broad minded in character and would not willingly place an obstacle in the way to keep the celebration in the southern city from becoming an unqualified success. The Tonopah people are of the magnanimous sort, as has been displayed time and time again during the past years. For them to resort to childish tactics, as charged by the Goldfield paper would be an utter impossibility. The falsity of the charge is easily apparent to those who are acquainted with the Tonopah spirit and to those who are familiar with the reasons that lie back of the accusation. However, it is not an easy matter to remain idle when false reports are being circulated about Tonopah and its inhabitants and as a consequence an instant denial was made.

**Champ Clark Condemned**

The democratic national convention repudiated its leader, Clark, and to be consistent should have turned down its tariff for revenue free trade policy and all the democratic house of representatives stands for and contends, free sugar, farmers' free trade measure, abolition of the non-partisan tariff board, and the destruction of the navy.

Bryan, the erstwhile, persistent advocate of the principle of "Let the people rule," was the most conspicuous to violate that principle for which he has been most insistent. The people of Nebraska instructed its delegates to the national unterrified assemblage, to cast its vote for Clark, yet Bryan, the irresistible, was the first and foremost to violate such instructions. He stands today as the breaker of pledges, the violator of instructions and the brazen apostle of political dishonesty.

We have not heard of Carnegie coming to the support of Woodrow Wilson now that he has been nominated on the democratic ticket. It is probable that the New Jersey governor would now refuse assistance from the canny Scot steel magnate. Things are different now.

T and S-Taft and Sherman can be construed to mean true and steady. W and M for Wilson and Marshall is easily translated as worse and more-of-it.

## Washington News In Weekly Letter From.... United Press

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Without a counterpart in the world is a laundry machine in the bureau of engraving and printing, the plant where the government turns out the national supply of currency. A great item of expense has been the production of new bills to take the place of crumpled, worn and germ-laden paper money, sent in for redemption.

It has had sufficient use to prove its success in taking the wrinkles and dirt and germs out of badly used currency. Two young ladies have been placed in charge of the laundry. One feeds the soiled money to one end of the machine and the other stacks the clean, crisp, laundered notes as they come through.

Before the machine had been placed in practical service the claims made for it attracted the attention of government officials in several European countries. They sent over samples of much abused currency and were delighted in the condition in which it was returned to them.

Hundreds of people have seen the machine in action. Many of those who laughed at the inventor and others associated with him in his effort to put such a machine on the market, are today loud in their praises for the wonderful piece of machinery. It is estimated that in eight hours between 30,000 and 35,000 old bills can be laundered.

National bank presidents have been asked to sign notes from their institutions in strong, indelible ink, so that when such bills are put through the laundry the ink will not fade. As it is today bank presidents sign notes with any kind of ink, from plain plink berry juice up to ordinary five cent ink. These fade in the laundry machine.

signer of the new machine. He is rather timid in regard to accepting the praise due him, and it was only after much questioning that his friends could establish the fact that he was the inventor. Samuel Elder of Philadelphia, for 14 years a machinist at the bureau, followed the designs of Mr. Smith and made the machine. They were laughed at but now they are enjoying together the victory they have won.

What is tachygraphy? is a query that popped into the minds of many who read a notice given out recently by a government department. It was to the effect: "The Spanish minister at Washington announces that the tenth international congress on tachygraphy, organized by the Spanish tachygraphic federation, will be held at Madrid, September 26 to October 2, 1912. An invitation is extended to the stenographers of the United States to take part in this congress."

Rather a remarkable experience was that of George E. Diggs, head waiter in a fashionable apartment, who, for almost a lifetime, unknowingly carried in his anatomy a piece of glass one-eighth of an inch wide and five-eighths of an inch long. Although the glass had been hidden in the flesh of his jaw for a quarter of a century, Diggs did not begin to feel the effects of it until recently. He went to a physician who prescribed a liniment, which had the effect of drawing the glass to the surface of the skin. Feeling a hard substance in his jaw Diggs pulled it out and found it was a fragment of glass. He explains that when but four years old he pulled a window on himself and that pieces of glass stuck in his jaw, but at the time it was thought that all of them had been removed.

An interesting story of the conservation of forests in Russia comes from Consul H. Grout, stationed at Odessa. That the Russians, backward in many things, have long been foreseeing in the matter of timber supply as told by Grout, who says: "While the privately owned woodland of Russia is being annually brought into use, and for a long time to come they will continue to be an important reserve timber supply for the world. These forests cover 397,000,000 acres, a proportion of which is well stocked. The increasing utilization of state forests is shown by increasing receipts from the sale of timber, which have risen from \$9,486,300 in 1890 to \$42,525,610 in 1911."
