

## ENGLAND MAKES PROTEST AND WILL APPEAL HAGUE TRIBUNAL

WASHINGTON, August 28.—Mitchell Innes, British charge de affaires has filed England's protest to the canal bill, taking exception to the provision granting free tolls to American coastwise vessels. The note advises this government that detailed objection will be filed later, and announces that England intends to take the matter to the Hague tribunal, alleging that it violates the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

## NEW STRUCTURE IS ERECTED ON BONANZA LOT

PRINTERS TIRE OF BATHS SO  
BUILDING IS CONSTRUCTED  
TO REMOVE COMPLAINTS

After nearly two months of tent life, the Bonanza working department is now sheltered in a real house. The building was constructed on the lot in the rear of the old Bonanza office and is a gem in architecture. It is large, airy and commodious and will answer every demand. The quarters were cramped and in addition the ground floor was covered with several inches of dust, making the place somewhat disagreeable. Every day was Saturday and naturally they kicked.

The several new departments will be running smoothly by the end of the present week and job work will then be turned out with greater dispatch than heretofore.

## YOUNG SON OF EUGENE HOWELL FRACTURES ARM

MEETS WITH ACCIDENT BY  
FALLING DOWN STAIRS AT  
GLENBROOK INN

Haines, the 5 1/2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Howell of this city met with an unfortunate accident several days ago at Glenbrook, one of the resorts bordering upon Lake Tahoe, when he broke his left arm near the elbow. The lad fell down the stairs of the Glenbrook Inn a few minutes before the family was to depart for Carson.

Temporary relief was furnished at Glenbrook and on the arrival of the party at Carson the fracture was reduced by a physician in that city. Advice received today state that the youngster is recovering and it is expected that no ill results will follow the fracture as an X-ray photograph was taken, showing the bones to be knitting nicely.

NORTH COBALA, Ont., August 28.—The 3-year-old son of Charley Clark caused the death of his 11-month-old sister last night by pouring acid into her mouth. The mother of the child was out of the room when the elder child got hold of the poison bottle.

ENGLISH PREMIER GIVES SHORT

The premier said: "As far as Canada is concerned the votes for women is a matter entirely for the provincial legislature to decide. Anyway the Canadian women are best able to decide for themselves what they want."

## KILLS MOTHER OF SWEETHEART THEN ROBS BODY

AFTER COMMITTING MURDER  
YOUTH VISITS CITY TO SEE  
SWEETHEART

HAGERSTOWN, Md., August 28.—Separated from his sweetheart, Lalah Henry, Norman McCleary, age 23, confessed today that he strangled her mother, Mrs. Nannie Henry and after her death stole \$40 from his victim and went to Washington to seek the girl.

The mother had objected to McCleary's attentions and warned him away.

### DR. COWDEN RECOVERING FROM AUTO ACCIDENT

Dr. J. C. Cowden, who was injured about a week ago when his own automobile ran over him, is now able to be about the streets with the aid of crutches. Dr. Cowden was beneath his machine when it started, and painfully injured his leg. At first it was thought a fracture had resulted, but subsequent developments proved otherwise. The medico expects to completely recover from the accident in about a week.

### WILL SINK KATAHDIN

WASHINGTON, August 28.—The old naval ram Katahdin will be fired upon by vessels of the Atlantic fleet in target practice early in September. The tests are planned to demonstrate the action of 12 1/2-inch guns upon new armor plate, with which the navy is experimenting and will be witnessed by members of the naval affairs committees of both houses of congress.

### FRENCH ARMY AVIATOR IS BURNED TO DEATH

PARIS, August 28.—Lieutenant Lewis Chandenier of the army aviation corps was burned to death while flying from Douai to Chalons today. Flames from the petrol tank enveloped the machine and the aeroplane fell to earth.

### SOCIETY WOMAN CHARGED CONDUCTING GAMBLING RESORT

OAKLAND, August 28.—Charged with conducting a women's gambling place here, Mrs. L. A. Brink, a wealthy Berkeley, society woman, was released on \$1000 bonds today to appear for trial later.

### NAVY OFFICIALS WORRIED OVER GUNBOAT VICKSBURG

SAN DIEGO, August 28.—Navy officials are worried over the safety of the gunboat Vicksburg. Monday it was reported near the entrance of Magdalena bay. Efforts to locate the both last night and this morning failed.

### TO MAKE INVESTIGATIONS CONDITIONS ON BORDER

WASHINGTON, August 28.—Colonel Walter Schuyler, army commandant for California, has been ordered to investigate conditions on the New Mexico and Arizona borders.

## TO FILE SUIT AND COLLECT FUNDS FOR THE STATE

ATTORNEY GENERAL WILL INSIST  
ON ESTATE REVERTING  
TO STATE FUND

Attorney General Cleve Baker has gone to Elko and will institute proceedings there to collect the sum of about \$40,000 alleged to be the property of the state of Nevada. He may be detained there for several days.

Some years ago Hiram Case, a wealthy farmer of Elko county, died and left no will and no known relatives, and it is claimed that a search has failed to reveal any relatives. Where there are no relatives to claim the property and it is not willed under the law it reverts to the state.

There have been a number of alleged heirs appear to claim the estate but so far none has secured it and now the state intends to take a hand and endeavor to collect the money for the state treasury.

## MANY TOWNS IN ENGLAND INUNDATED FROM FLOODS

THOUSANDS ARE HOMELESS AND  
MILLIONS IN DAMAGE IS  
SUSTAINED

LONDON, August 28.—Freshets are flooding England. Norwich is practically isolated and many towns are inundated. Railroads are paralyzed and crops worth millions of pounds have been ruined.

Three thousand families are homeless, as the downpour has been interrupted for two months. Sums have been subscribed for the aid of the sufferers. It will take weeks to replace the bridges and repair the washouts.

## PRINTERS TO KEEP TAB ON THE LEGISLATURE

NEVADA PRESS ASSOCIATION  
WILL HAVE COMMITTEE TAKE  
CARE OF INTERESTS

That the Nevada Press association intends to keep an eye on the next session of the state legislature was evidenced Monday afternoon at the annual meeting at Reno, when a committee was appointed to report at a meeting in December, at which time a committee will be appointed to attend the session of the legislature in the interests of the publishers. Heretofore the newspapers have had no active organization and in consequence it is claimed have not received the attention or consideration to which they believe themselves entitled.

A new executive committee was appointed by President W. W. Booth, consisting of Messrs. J. Holman Buck, D. E. Williams and L. E. Clark.

Matters of importance to publishers were considered and a committee appointed to take up the matter of inducing all newspaper publishers in the state to become members of the association.

## NEGRO ATTORNEY RESIGNS FROM THE BAR ASSOCIATION

ACTION IS TAKEN TO COMPEL  
ASSOCIATION TO GO ON RE-  
CORD ON NEGRO QUESTION

MILWAUKEE, August 28.—It was learned today that William Morris of Minneapolis, one of the negroes, has sent his resignation to the executive committee of the American Bar association so worded as to compel the association to go on record on the negro question.

The resignation of Lewis Wilson, one of the other negroes, will probably follow.

Morris resignation was unanimously accepted, preventing a row in the convention. A resolution accepting the resignation was presented by J. N. Merrill of Georgia, who commended the "fine spirit" Morrow showed.

## TENTH INFANTRY ORDERED TO SAIL FOR NICARAGUA

AMERICAN SOLDIERS ARE ORDERED  
TO QUELL SOUTH AMERICAN  
REVOLUTION

WASHINGTON, August 28.—The state department has requested President Taft to order the Tenth Infantry, stationed at Panama, to sail for Corinto, Nicaragua, immediately. This is the first time in years that American soldiers have been sent to Central America to quell a rebellion.

### MANY WHISKY DRINKERS

ST. ALANS, Vt., August 28.—Continuing his discussion of the high cost of living, which has been his subject since he entered Vermont five days ago, Eugene W. Chafin, prohibition candidate for president, said in an address here today that no less than 10,000,000 persons in the United States have by reason of the liquor traffic ceased to be producers and have become consumers only.

"This," he said, "is the explanation of the increasing cost of living."

### MUST ANSWER CHARGES

NEW YORK, August 28.—John A. Flack, former cashier of the Abilene State bank, of Kansas, was taken back home today to answer charges that he embezzled \$82,000 from the institution. Sheriff Young of Abilene had him in custody.

## MODIFY ORDER FOR DELIVERY OF MAIL SUNDAYS

ONLY MAIL BOX PATRONS WILL  
BE ALLOWED LETTERS ON

WASHINGTON, August 28.—The postal department issued orders today slightly relaxing the order preventing Sunday delivery at first and second class offices. Carrier window deliveries are still forbidden but lockbox holders are permitted access to their mail.

## PRIMARIES FOR ALL PARTIES HELD IN MICHIGAN

REPUBLICANS PLACE AMOS MUSSELMAN  
IN NOMINATION  
FOR GOVERNOR

DETROIT, August 28.—Incomplete returns show that republicans have nominated Amos Musselman for governor, the democrats Woodright Ferris, and the progressives L. W. Watkins.

Seventeen of the 18 Detroit aldermen accused of grafting sought renomination and the indications are that most were renominated, but the returns are slow.

### WANTS PAY FOR COW

WASHINGTON, August 28.—William Smith, a Union Civil war veteran, wants pay for his cow, which was starved to death during the recent Mississippi floods. He says the warrant officer in charge of the Algiers naval station, opposite New Orleans, refused shelter to his cow, although the stock of other flood sufferers was being cared for within the station. Acting Secretary Winthrop has declined to admit the responsibility of the department.

### ALL RECORDS BROKEN

CHICAGO, August 28.—Previous entry records for western automobile road races were broken today when 34 nominations for the five races to be run at Elgin next Friday and Saturday were announced as certain starters. The largest number of entries previously recorded was 32 last year.

### INSANE MAN RUNS AMUCK

CHICAGO, August 28.—Guests of a small Michigan avenue hotel were panic stricken early today when an unidentified man strolled into the lobby and announced that he was "going to kill everybody in sight."

Drawing a revolver, he fired three shots at Ross Odell, the clerk, who returned the fire, sending evil bullets into his assassin's body. The man probably was fatally injured. The police believe he is insane. Odell was uninjured.

## MEXICAN IS FINED HEAVILY TOTING GUN

CHARGE OF ROBBERY IS REDUCED  
AND LESSER COMPLAINT  
ISSUED

The case of Manuel Maryinez, called in the justice court, was heard this morning at 10 o'clock and after the taking of testimony had been concluded it was decided that the charge be reduced to the carrying of a concealed weapon.
