PROSPECTING FOR POTASH DEPOSITS AT SILVER PEAK

LOCATOR OF LANDS WILL TAKE LARGE NUMBER OF SAMPLES TO BE TESTED

C. H. Barnard, who is interested in and was one of the first to file locations on the potash deposits at the edge of the Silver Peak salt marsh, 18 miles west of Goldfield, has returned to town and will go out again within a day or two, prepared to take a large number of samples and to prospect the ground thoroughly, says the Tribune. He will sink a number of auger holes, preserving the material obtained in this manner, and will send the samples to several laboratories in order to secure a careful check on the results obtained.

It is reported that the discoveries made here and the assay returns have aroused widespread interest in these deposits and that they may be investigated by men connected with large interests that have been seeking potash deposits throughout the west. Samples of the product will also be sent to the government laboratories for testing. Barnard has perfected the surveys on a number of the locations filed on by others and has "tied" these surveys to the government stakes, as required by law. The "Potash Joe" Shirley interests will also perform a large amount of work on the adjoining ground and will obtain a large number of samples.
