**FRED SKINNER IS AGAIN AN INMATE OF THE STATE PRISON AFTER THREE WEEKS LIBERTY**

Fred Skinner, the Nye county murderer, who escaped from the state prison about three weeks ago, is again confined in that institution. He was brought back from San Francisco, where he was captured, and after spending a night in the city jail at Reno, was returned to Carson yesterday. In speaking of the arrest and of the privations endured by Skinner in effecting his escape, the Reno Journal has the following: "Well, warden, I'm glad to see you."

"Well, I'm glad to see you." Such was the salutation at the meeting of Warden Cowing of the Nevada state prison and Fred Skinner in San Francisco Sunday morning. Cowing arrived there on No. 3 and proceeded at once to the city prison. He was anxious to identify the man that was supposed to be Skinner and settle his mind once and for all that he was after the real Skinner who had eluded his vigil at the Nevada state prison and made the sensational escape that has not only been the subject of statewide comment, but also the cause of a prison board investigation, the result of which has not yet been announced.

Skinner and his sister Mabel Falkner were busily engaged in conversation when Warden Cowing arrived and after a few minutes talk the warden left them alone to say goodbye. Skinner waived extradition stating to the warden that he was pleased to return to the prison as he was tired, disgusted and sorry for the move he had made.

Skinner's story of his escape as related by himself is as follows:

After making his way through the electrified fence which surrounds the yard of the prison he started to the hills west of Carson City. There he hid, making his way toward Reno and the main line by night journeys. He got along fairly well for the first couple of days, eating at ranches along the way having found enough old clothes to cover his nakedness during his wanderings.

A couple of days after he left the prison he encountered a snow storm which caused him a great deal of suffering and during which time he contracted a severe cold which settled on his lungs. This caused him a great deal of worry and several times he resolved that he would return to the prison and give himself up.

He continued on, however, and on Saturday, the 5th of the present month, arrived at the Tule clubhouse near Glendale. This was during the night and he slept in the barn there. This was the first night's sleep he had had inside since his escape, the other nights being spent in the sagebrush and willows along the trail he had taken from the prison.

In the morning on leaving the barn he met the game warden at the preserve. The badge of authority that the latter wore caused him some apprehension, but he explained that he had lost his way. This satisfied the game warden and he was given a good breakfast and also a chance to assist in the work at the preserve, which consisted mostly of feeding the ducks and chores about the place.

Skinner at this time was suffering severely from the cold that he had contracted by the exposure he had been subjected to. Leaving there

he went to Sparks, arriving there early Sunday morning. He had left the prison with \$1.75 which he had concealed in his pockets. He also had a watch. He purchased a flask of whisky at Sparks and something to eat and sold his watch for \$10. With this money he bought a ticket for San Francisco and passed through Reno on No. 3 Sunday morning.

On arriving in San Francisco he secured some money from his sister and purchased a clean suit of clothes. After arriving at the coast he stated that he did not know what to do and was still undetermined as to his future movements when he was arrested.

As to the telegram sent to Warden Cowing, a copy of which has been published in the Journal, Skinner says he has no knowledge whatever. At the time the message was sent he was at Sparks and it has been proven that he had nothing whatever to do with it. The same applies to the sister who had no knowledge of her brother's whereabouts at the time the message was sent.

After the arrival of Warden Cowing at the coast it was found that the man whom the telegraph had described as being Skinner was a party who bore a like resemblance to the escapee.

This phase of the case seems to be worrying Skinner as he has been unable to find a solution to this part of the affair. He stated to Warden Cowing last night that he was sick and tired of the worry that has followed his escape from prison and that he had repeatedly determined to give himself up to the officers in various places.

He is still suffering from a severe cold as a result of his experience and last night was sleeping peacefully at the city prison, where he stated it would be the first real night's sleep he had had since his escape.

Warden Cowing referred to the part of the telegram he had received in which it was stated that he had confessed that he had killed 15 people. Skinner laughed it off but told of the killing of his brother-in-law in Wyoming some years ago.

His sister, who was in a delicate condition, had been the subject of repeated attacks by her husband, the result of which came nearly causing her death. After her recovery the husband again attacked the sister in Skinner's presence and the latter killed him. He was arrested and during his confinement prior to his trial a jail delivery was pulled off and he escaped with the rest.

After being out, six weeks he returned to the jail and surrendered himself. He was tried and sentenced to 15 months. He secured a second trial and was acquitted. From Wyoming he came to Nevada and located in the southern country during the boom days and later shot and killed Mona Bell for which crime he is serving 50 years in the Nevada penitentiary.

In talking to the warden he stated that he has had his escape framed up for a couple of months; that no one assisted him, but that he pulled off the stunt alone and could have done it prior to the time he did. He prides himself that he violated no pledge of honor in doing so and apparently returns willingly to the prison to take his medicine.

As to the man Rylee who was arrested here as the man who was to assist Skinner in his escape, the latter states that he never put any faith in him owing to his drug habit and that after leaving the prison he entirely ignored all pre-arranged plans.

Warden Cowing had no statement to make last night when asked as to the punishment that would be meted out to the escapee when he was returned to the prison this morning. That will depend on many circumstances and later investigations. The warden was accompanied to the coast by Lieutenant of the Guard Kelly, who acted as an escort to the prisoner from the coast. They will take Skinner to Carson City on the V. & T. this morning.

The prisoners of good behavior will be attired in plain clothing of civilians. The prisoners are to be graded into three classes. Upon entering the prisons the convicts are admitted to the second class, and their conduct will determine whether they will don the stripes or plain clothing.
