

TURKISH AND BULGARIAN TROOPS ADVANCING REPORTED MONTENEGRIN ARMY SUSTAINS DEFEAT

BULGARIAN KING ISSUES PROCLAMATION EXPLAINING CAUSE WAR

Proclamation Issued

SOBIA, Oct. 18.—A striking proclamation to the Bulgarian nation was issued by King Ferdinand today. It recounts the suffering of the Macedonian Christians in the efforts of the powers to obtain better treatment for them, and says he called the people to arms only after the patience of the Balkan nations had been exhausted.

Turkish Garrison Flees

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The entire Turkish garrison at Berana, numbering 7000, fled last night before the capture of the town by the Montenegrins, according to an official dispatch received here.

The Turkish and Bulgarian forces are both advancing today. It is thought possible they will meet near Mustapha Pasha, one of the new passes through the mountains leading to Bulgaria and Macedonia. The Servian army is on its way to Uskup, where another big battle is expected. It is reported the Montenegrin army suffered a bad defeat at Podgoritza.

Greek Fleet Sails

ATHENS, Oct. 18.—The Greek fleet has received orders to sail tonight. As the orders are sealed the destination is unknown.

Turkish Victory Predicted

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Experts are of the opinion that Turkey's suddenly assuming the aggressive was to surprise the allied armies who were not prepared. Diplomats predict a Turkish victory, but it is feared this will not end the trouble. Russia and Austria are ready to intervene and if they do other powers will be involved.

Turkish Warship Sunk

Unconfirmed reports have been received that a large Turkish warship struck a mine and was blown up at the entrance of Varna harbor. The ship was maneuvering for a position to shell the Bulgarian port.

Germans to Be Used

ATHENS, Oct. 18.—It is semi-officially stated that Turkish surgeons are en route from Janina to the Greek frontier armed with tubes filled with typhus cholera. The tubes will be loosed upon the enemy.

FUNERAL HELD UNDER AUSPICES MINERS' UNION

REMAINS OF LUDWIG PETERSON ARE PLACED AT REST IN CITY CEMETERY

The remains of Ludwig Peterson, the miner who succumbed to an attack of pneumonia Wednesday evening at the Miners' hospital, were interred in the local cemetery this afternoon. The funeral was held under the auspices of the Miners' union, of which organization the deceased was a member. Services were held at the undertaking parlors of Wagoner and Hall.

Two children arrived this morning from Los Angeles and joined the grief stricken mother and younger sister, who arrived here three hours after death claimed Mr. Peterson.

The services at the undertaking parlors were conducted by the Rev. George Gallup, prelate of the Loyal Order of Moose, of which order the deceased was a member.

SOCIALIST LECTURER TO DELIVER ADDRESS TONIGHT

DISCOUNT RATE RAISED

LONDON, Oct. 18.—The rate of discount of the Bank of England was raised from 4 to 5 per cent.

The announcement was the natural outcome of the refusal of the bank on Monday to discount bills below that level owing to the abnormal difference between the money market and the discount rate as well as the Balkan war and the actual and prospective gold demands.

LARGEST BULLION SHIPMENT IN TONOPAH HISTORY MADE

TRAINING SHIP LEAVES

The cruise to St. Helena will be made without stop and will take about three months.

TELLS OFFICERS HE AIDED IN DYNAMITING

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Declaring that he assisted in dynamiting the Los Angeles Times and was guilty of other bomb outrages, John Cook appeared before officials in the department of justice today and begged to be taken in Indianapolis immediately to face trial. Cook, who would not give his address, was held pending advices from Indianapolis and further examination of his story.

SERVIAN VOLUNTEERS WHO LEAVE SUNDAY TO FIGHT THE TURKS WILL TRAVEL ABOARD A SPECIAL CAR

A company of between 30 and 50 Servian and Montenegrin patriots will leave Tonopah Sunday morning for their fatherland to enlist in the army and engage in the war with Turkey. An enthusiastic meeting was held last night by the Young Men's Servian society and arrangements for the departure of the patriots Sunday was practically completed.

The volunteers will march to the depot, preceded by the Tonopah military band. At the station an impromptu leaving will be had. Brief speeches will be delivered and the volunteers will take their departure with the cheers of their countrymen, who are unable to leave, ringing in their ears. Of the number returning to their native country, several are without means of paying the cost of transportation, and the necessary funds have been provided by countrymen.

ROOSEVELT WILL BE ABLE TO LEAVE HOSPITAL ON MONDAY

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Roosevelt awoke early. He was full of vigor and assured the nurse he had a perfectly "bully" night. The physicians' bulletin said his condition was so good he would be allowed to sit up an hour today. Then, unless some latent progress should be felt itself, the progress should be rapid. The colonel plans to go to Oyster Bay Monday.

Twenty-five policemen escorted Governor Johnson today from the railway station to his hotel. The guard was ordered by the chief of police as a result of attempted assassination of Roosevelt. The governor delivers a noon address and held a conference with Roosevelt and the progressive managers. He will speak tonight at south Chicago.

DEFENSE OPENS CASE IN THE TRIAL OF LIEUTENANT BECKER
