

BALKAN ALLIES ARE VICTORIOUS Turkish Troops Fall Back When Attacked

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Oct. 23.—Bloody battles are being fought today on every side of the Balkan peninsula and military experts believe the allied armies of Bulgaria, Serbia, Montenegro and Greece had the best of the preliminary skirmishes. Both Turks and Bulgarians are advancing in the vicinity of Adrianople and the Serbian commander reports the Turks falling back along the whole front. Most of the regular trained Turkish troops will not be encountered until Uskup is reached.
Leaving the torpedo boat flotilla to blockade the Bulgarian coast the

Turkish fleet will refit against the Greek fleet which is active in the Mediterranean.

Turks Again Victorious
ATHENS, Oct. 23.—The Greek army defeated the Turkish troops beyond Elassona after a vigorous attack and the Turks are retreating to the town of Servia, according to a dispatch from Crown Prince Constantine, commander-in-chief of the Greeks.

Servians Capture Town
NICH, Servia, Oct. 23.—The important Turkish town of Novipacur was captured by Servians today after severe fighting with heavy losses.

The deceased left Tonopah about four months ago and spent some time with her husband visiting in San Francisco. On their return to Virginia City Mrs. Erickson was taken ill with pneumonia and at that time her condition was critical. She partially recovered, but complications set in and for the last week she had been serious. Ed Erickson was called to her bedside about ten days ago.

The deceased is survived by her husband, one son, E. J. Erickson, and two daughters, Mrs. F. D. Black of Virginia City and Mrs. W. A. Brown of this city. She was aged 62 years and resided for a long period in Eureka, Nevada, before coming to this city. The funeral will be held at Reno on Friday, the interment to be in the Masonic cemetery.

Whether this is true or not will remain for the county central committee to determine. The nomination must be made not later than ten days before election, and Thursday is within the limit of time specified by law.

MUST HAVE BEEN
CANNED VARIETY

DEMOCRATIC PAPERS REPORT
SPEECH THAT NEVER WAS
DELIVERED BY NEWLANDS

The following story, sent out by the democratic state central committee at Reno, to the Virginia Chronicle, is just as truthful as the arguments that are being made by certain members of the democratic press, in urging the election of the national candidates from this state. As to truthfulness, there is absolutely none in the story, for Senator Newlands failed to make his appearance at the meeting scheduled for Monday night, owing to being ill in his apartments at the Mizpah hotel.
For the benefit of the Tonopah voters, the fake press dispatch is reproduced as follows:
TONOPAH, Nev., Oct. 21.—With one of those good old time rallies which show enthusiasm for democracy and presage a victory in November for Woodrow Wilson, Senator Newlands was received here today and spoke to a great crowd this evening. With that clear, calm style so familiar to Nevadans he told of the necessity of electing Key Pittman to the senate to help Wilson secure progressive legislation. He showed how foolish it would be to elect a president and then fail to give him support in the two houses of congress. Senator Newlands was in Mr. Pittman's home city, but he was surprised at the wild enthusiasm which greeted the mention of the name of the democratic candidate for senator.

VERA CRUZ, Oct. 23.—General Felix Diaz, with his whole staff, was captured today. All the rebels have been disarmed. The casualties are insignificant.

The federal troops are in complete possession of the city. A slight resistance was made.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—A battle between the rebel forces of General Felix Diaz and the federal troops under General Beltram, that has been impending for several days, began this morning, according to a cable from Commander Hughes of the cruiser Des Moines, to the navy department.
